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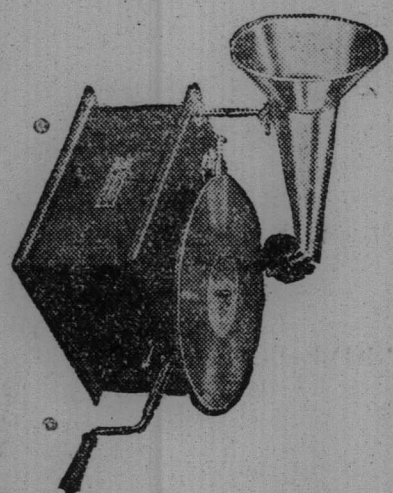

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NOTABLE WILLS IN LITERATURE

One of the most famous wills in fiction is that of Dr. Jekyll in "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde." This will Mr. Utterson, "lean, long, dusty, dreary, and yet somehow lovable," refused to write as by it Dr. Jekyll left his possessions to his "friend and benefactor," Edward Hyde.

In "Mr. Meeson's Will," Rider Haggard tells of a particularly noxious publisher, whose chief aim in life seems to be to crush out of his authors all their originality and to conceal their identity by sinking their name in numbers, entering into a cruel contract with the heroine—a writer of novels—and the hero protests, is driven out of the business, but into love with the heroine. The heroine sets sail for distant shores, and by a remarkable coincidence the wicked publisher voyages by the same ship. The ship is wrecked and the two are cast on a desert island, and live for a time in the manner of Robinson Crusoe.

The publisher, however, overcome by his experience, falls ill. Whilst in a dying condition he is afflicted with tormenting visions of suffering authors whom he has crushed and driven to despair, and of his nephew, whom he has disinherited. He seeks to make reparation by making a will in his nephew's favor.

The will is tattooed across her shoulders. This is done in spite of the physical pain she is called upon to endure. Of course, she is picked up by a passing vessel, rejoins her lover, and succeeds in establishing his rights.

In Pinero's play of that title, Iris, a beautiful widow of twenty-one, finds herself hampered by the terms of her husband's will, which deprives her of its benefits if she remarries. Such a condition is perfectly legal and is much indulged in by dying husbands. All men, however, do not think alike, and it is on record that one man left all his property to his wife—a termagant—on the express condition that she remarried, because, as he naively put it, he "wanted somebody to be sorry he had died."

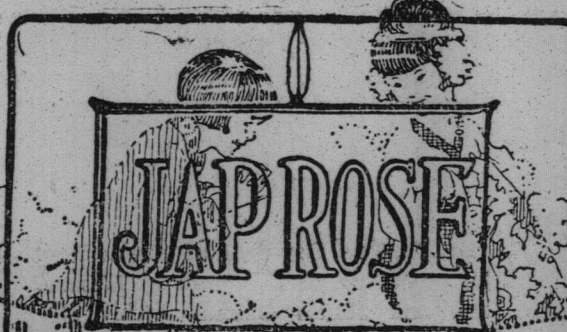

Crops Promise Bumper Year

Second Report For 1920 Indicates
Best Condition At This Date
Since 1904

WINNIPEG, June 17—In presenting
its second crop report for 1920, the
Manitoba Free Press announces that
it indicates about the best condition
of crops at this date of any year

since 1904, when these reports began,
with possibly the single exception of
1912, when the June crop conditions
were as nearly perfect as it is possible
to hope for. This present report
is much more encouraging than the
early June report of the famous
Bumper year of 1915, as during the
early part of June of that year heavy

frosts occurred and the crop had not
fully recovered from them.

The last week of May there were
very high winds reported and there
was serious apprehension of damage
from this source. The reports indicate
that the heavy rains and cool
weather have not only stopped the
drifting and blowing, but that to a
very great extent the crop has recovered
without re-seeding being necessary.
Where seeding has been done it
is mainly oats.

Very grave apprehension has ex-
isted as to grasshoppers, and all cor-
respondents in the infected areas
were asked as to hoppers. The re-
plies on the whole show that the weath-
er has retarded hatching, but
whether permanently or not remains
to be seen. Only two points, both in
Manitoba, namely, Waskada and
Clearwater, report any serious dam-
age up to the present. All points re-
port fine organization to fight the
pests and abundant supplies of
poison for bait.

Grasshoppers' Plague

The most northern point reporting
any sign of hoppers is Outlook, Sask.
All that human energy can do is be-
ing done to prevent a spread of the
plague should hotter weather develop
them.

The strong feature of the report is
the abundant supply of moisture
throughout the entire West. Only
a few points report any need of rain,
and these points add that there is
plenty of surface moisture, but
showers are needed to help germinate
the last sown grain.
