THE GARRISON.

The Herald is informed that definite instructions have been received from the withdrawal of the garrison from here. As we understand the position the 72nds are leaving on Monday, and it is expected that the bulk of the 104th will follow a few days later. These men are not to be replaced by others, and Nanaimo will cease to be a garrison city and will not be used as a training camp. From the point of view of business alone this action on the part of the military authorities is a serious thing for Nanaimo. If the step is called for by military exigencies there is, of course, nothing more to be said, but if it is the result of wirepulling, either municipal or political, then there is a good deal to be said and more to be done. Nanaimo offers exceptional advantages as a training camp, and as the fourth city in the province is entitled to equal consideration with the other cities. It is now up to her leading citizens to see that she gets it. The removal of the camp has been common knowledge for at least two weeks, and vigorous action should have been taken at once. It is not too late even now. We do not believe the step would have been taken had the position been thoroughly understood by the authorities. The same kind of thing was attempted with another city, not very far from and not much bigger than Nanaimo, but prompt and resolute action by its representative in the Dominion House and by its citizens and public bodies prevented it from being carried out. The same action must be taken here. It is only a matter of enlightening the proper authorities, but it must be done at once.

ROYALTY AND THE WAR

As was to be expected the removal of the Grand Duke Nicholas from the

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supreme command of the Russian armies is the great topic of interest in the press of the world. Various explanations have been advanced, none of which can be said to be very convincing. In the first place the suppression of the Grand Duke was entirely unexpected, and the fact that the Czar should assume the command only adds to the mystery. All the military critics whose writings we have seen are agreed that the Grand Duke has displayed wonderful military ability. The reverses the Russian armies have suffered since the beginning of May have not been due to mistakes in leadership, or to deterioration in men, but to faults of administration. The Russians have never had anything like the artillery brought against them by the Germans, and have never had even an adequate supply of ammunition for the guns they possessed. It is said that there has even been a shortage in small arms, and that men have gone into battle without a rifle. The Czar could have found work to his hand in Petrograd in straightening out the administrative services, getting rid of incompetents, and generally speeding up the supplies for his armies in the field. Instead of this he has retired the one man who observers all over the world are agreed has saved Russia from disaster by his masterly military skill.

For such an action there must be a compelling reason, and there is a tendency in some quarters to ascribe it to German influence. The Czarina is a sister of the Kaiser, and there has always been a strong German clique in Petrograd court circles. So now, it is said, that under the stress of adversity, the German element has become paramount, and that the dismissal of the Grand Duke Nicholas is the first step in a plan to secure a separate peace. The explanation is feasible enough, but in view of the increasing power of the Duma we hardly think the Czar would be strong enough to carry it out, even if it were true that he wanted to. On the face of it it appears to be a huge mistake to relieve the Grand Duke of his command just at this juncture in the war, but he has had able commanders associated with him and these leaders will no doubt direct and advise the Czar in the conduct of the campaign. At the same time the very fact that such an explanation should have been so widely circulated will once more draw attention to the family ramifications of the crowned heads of Europe.

ope. The war is doing many curious things, and it would not be surprising if among others, it introduced a little modern reform into royal marriage laws and customs. At the outbreak of the war the British people demanded the resignation of the Duke of Battenberg. The demand may have been unfair and uncalled for, but the Duke resigned his command. The wishes of the people of Greece have been set at naught simply because their King took for his wife a German Princess, the sister of the Kaiser. And last of all we have this story of German intrigue in the Russian capital. It would not be strange after this if the people of the European countries should prefer their Kings and Queens of their own race and their own blood. There is no longer any necessity for the maintenance of a monopoly in royalty. A queen of England would be none the less popular because of her being an Englishwoman even if she was not of royal blood. It is a question of which more may be heard after the war is ended.

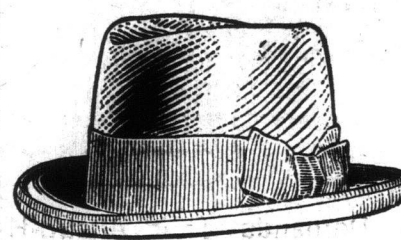

Southfield workings, letting in an enormous quantity of water and drowning nineteen men, including Mr. Foy the mine manager, who entered the mine to try and rescue the trapped men and perished in the attempt. Mr. Justice Murphy's report is a very voluminous document of forty-eight typewritten pages. On the question of the main issue, His Lordship reports:

"The responsibility for the South Wellington disaster on Mr. Graham's part is, however, purely negative. He is to blame, not for what he did, but for what he did not do, and what his official position made it his duty to do. Mr. Tonkin played the active role. With the full knowledge that Mr. Graham was leaving everything to him, that he, Mr. Tonkin, proposed to remove the 100-foot barrier wall right up to the boundary and then turn and run west directly towards the supposed location of the old Southfield workings again, to his knowledge long abandoned and partly filled with water, and with the further knowledge which he must have had as manager that water was freely flowing into the South Wellington No. 3 north level 300 feet from the face, which water might be from a surface swamp and might be as turned out to be the fact—from the old Southfield workings, fully aware in addition that error meant death in all human probability to many miners, what did he do? He proceeded to South Wellington to inspect the data and come to a decision (he did not reside at the mine, but usually visited it once a week). He was aware that at Nanaimo, 4½ miles distant, the original map of the Southfield workings was open to inspection in the office of the Western Fuel Company. Instead of obtaining it, he had Wright produce, he says, Exhibits 3, 4 and 7—Wright says Exhibits 3 and 1—superimpose them, and in this he decided. . . . The main fact in this connection is that Mr. Tonkin knew he could have access to the original Southfield map at the office of the Western Fuel Company at Nanaimo, 4½ miles distant. Instead, he used copies, and copies which, on their face, considering the problem being decided, ought to have aroused suspicion. On him, in my opinion, rests the direct primary responsibility for the accident."

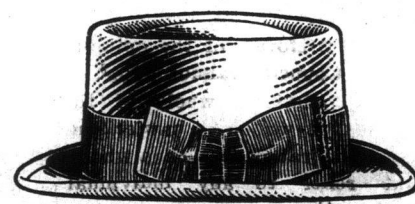
