Hon. Clifford Sitfon at Woodstock: "And now, what do we do? 
Germany Makes Europe Seethe

The Moroccan Question Again Acute, But the Perfect Accord Between Great Britain, France and Russia will Cause the Kaiser to Pause Before He Sets Aftre the Heather which would Cause a Gigantic Conflagration Throughout Europe.

London, Sept. 1.—A fair amount of war insurance was offered yesterday, and with the market becoming restricted, the rates advanced further on the risk of war breaking out between certain European powers without two months. Some risks were accepted at 8 per cent, and in some cases 10 per cent was quoted.

A Morocco mass meeting was held in Berlin last night, and all accounts indicate that the gathering resolved Itself into a violent demonstration against England. There has been no limilar public outburst of Angiophobia in Germany since the days of the Boer war.
