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Europe, New Brunswick, the Canadas, the North West Company's territories, denuded of their dense forests, and converted into fruitful fields, sprinkled over with popular towns, villages and hamlets; the north west wind warmed in its progress by passing through an atmosphere previously heated through, not only by the rays of the sun, either directly, or by radiation from the earth, but combined together with that artificial heat afforded by the innumerable domestic and manufactory fires, and we have asked ourselves the question, would our climate be better or worse for the change. That our winters would be more mild, that the cold would be less intense, that the Hillsborough would be frozen over about the same number of times in the course of a century, that the Thames or the Seine are at present, might perhaps be reckoned upon with something like certainty; for time has been when, according to the account given by Julius Cæsar in his commentaries, this was the case, and he flourished about 1000 years ago. What however would our summers? we very much question, whether they would be as much improved as the winters! We have a stray suspicion that the former would be as much too warm as the latter are—as is now thought by some people too cold. Instead of the gentle cooling zephyrs that come to us "like angel visits," though neither "few nor far between," might we not experience something like the deadly breath of the Sirocco, charged with fever, pestilence and cholera; parching the earth, and extracting from it every particle of moisture, and subjecting its inhabitants to all the ills that excessive heat is certain to engender! What would become of the vigorous health, the firm muscle, the inclination and the aptitude to labor that now distinguish the natives of Prince Edward Island, that which is slowly but not less surely converting the forests into fertile fields? Let us suppose our winters milder, let what falls now in the shape of snow take the form of rain,—would those winters gain in point of pleasantness? We think not; we are among those, few though they may be, who hold it as part of their faith, that every thing has been rightly ordered, and that Providence has wisely placed obstacles in the way of man's attaining his desires in order to stimulate him to exertion, and we see that in these northern countries, in consequence of the labor, mental and corporeal, that its people have to undergo, that the faculties attain to a higher pitch than those countries more richly endowed, as it is said, by the beneficence of nature. The less men have to do, the less they are willing to do, and the consequences of rich soil and warm sun is, to make men idle and voluptuous, two qualities which foster every vice that degrades our nature. Let us remember, that if the Hillsborough and the waters round our coast are fast bound in ice for four months out of the twelve, that in that time, they have afforded us an extent of railroad that no country of equal size can boast of, that if ten or twelve inches of snow cover the ground, that it enwraps the soil as with a mantle, and protects the roots of the trees and the vegetables, besides contributing as it does in no small degree to the fertility of the land. That if our breezes are frosty, they are kindly, that they harbor no concealed poison, but on the contrary, are the harbingers of health. In a word, let us make the best of the blessing which an all-wise Providence has endowed us with, overcoming the seeming evils and hardships of our lot with combinations of skill and industry, cultivating the soil and the mind till both are brought to the highest degree of perfection they are capable of, and depend upon it, we shall not in the long run be inferior, either in point of comfort or respectability, to any people upon earth.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday last, about 6 1/2 p. m., as Mr. Bourke's Steamer *Isis* was on her usual trip to Mount Stewart Bridge, and when within a mile of her destination, the alarm was given "a man killed." The engine was immediately stopped by Mr. Wm. Bourke, who, on reaching the Engine Room, saw a shapeless mass of what had been a human body. It was that of Mr. Terence Clarkin, the Engineer, who had, by some means, not accounted for, been precipitated, apparently head first, in among the operating machinery. It was a horrid spectacle; the body being so crushed that from the head to the waist, inclusive, it was not more than an inch in thickness, and the different parts comprising the body all intermixed. The parts were carefully taken up, under Mr. Bourke's superintendence, and a coffin having been procured, placed therein. The body was brought to town overland yesterday morning, when an inquest was held before D. Hodgson, Esq., and a verdict returned in accordance with the above facts. Deceased was much esteemed by his employer, and indeed by all who knew him. He has left a wife and family to mourn his loss.—*Adv.*

SAR ACCIDENT.—William Seaman, aged 35 years, son of Mr. William Seaman, sen., residing in Triestram Settlement, Lor 34, met with an accident on the 1st October, instant which resulted in his death on Monday night last, the 13th instant. It appears the deceased, on the day of the accident, was hauling brushwood for fuel, and

on passing his dwelling, stooped to remove a log of wood lying in the way of the cart, and at that moment, being close to the house, a part of the brush broke two or three panes of glass, the noise of which falling started his horse, and he fell, the wheel of the cart passing over one of his legs, breaking it in two places, and otherwise seriously bruising his body. He lingered for a number of days in great pain, when death terminated his sufferings. He has left a young widow, two children, and a large number of friends, to lament his untimely end.—*Isl.*
