Calgary advices of June 23rd say : Harvesting operations have already started on the big farms of the Noble Foundation i Southern Alberta. Eleven bind ers are at work cutting 2,50 acres of Rosen rye, a new variety which is being tried out for the first time in this province. This is proved to be the earliest grain yet raised, and is at least thirty days ahead of any other variety of rye. The grain is standing four feet high and assures heavy yield.
