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

A royalty at the rate of five cents per ton shall be collected the merchantable coal mined. Quartz.-A person eighteen years of

age, or over, having discovered nineral in place, may locate a claim .500 x 1.500 feet. The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase whe land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provides for the paynent of a royalty of 2 12 per cent. en the sale.

Placer mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

An applicant may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of he Interior.

The lessee shall have a dredge in peration within one season from the late of the lease for each five miles. Rental \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 2 1-2 per cent. collected on the utput after it exceeds \$10,000
