NEW YORK, April 6. A fire in the Beacon Meat Plant, at Business Ayres, caused a loss of \$600,000.

ATHENS, April 6. The Coronation of King Constantine of Greece, will not take place before next year.

LONDON, April 6. In the Association Football match on Saturday, England defeated Scotland by 1 to 0.

HAVRE, France, April 6. The body of the late Pierpont Morgan left here last evening for New York, on board the French liner France.

PITTSBURG, April 6. Three men were burned to death and two injured, probably fatally, as the result of an explosion at the Homestead Steel Works, belonging to the U. S. Steel Corporation, in this city.

WASHINGTON, April 6. The loss by the recent floods in the State of Ohio, is estimated as follows: 460 lives lost; 4,200 homes destroyed; 40,500 persons homeless; 9,000 families outside Dayton, Columbus and Cincinnati need rehabilitation.

LONDON, April 6. The British Court of Appeals has dismissed the White Star Line's appeal against the decision of the Admiralty Court, which placed the blame on the pilot of the liner Olympic for the collision with H.M.S. Hawke.

BERLIN, April 6. An infantryman committed suicide in a horrible way at Gatz, yesterday. He fixed a cord to the firing mechanism of a machine gun, stood in front of it, pulled the cord, and his body was torn to pieces.

NEW YORK, April 6. American suffragettes threaten to avoid the British Isles and British colonies, and so cause loss to hotel keepers, etc., in retaliation for the forcible feeding of the Emerson woman, and to help the English suffragettes.

WINNIPEG, April 6. The Canadian Pacific Railway will spend \$14,000,000 on a tunnel through the Kicking Horse Pass of the Rocky Mountains. The tunnel will take seven years to be built. It will be about 16 miles long, four miles longer than the simplest tunnel through the Alps.

HAMBURG, April 6. The largest passenger vessel in the world, 5,000 tons bigger than the Emperor, also of the Hamburg-American Line, was launched on Saturday. She was christened the "Vaterland" by Prince Rupprecht, of Bavaria. She will carry 4,050 passengers and 200 of a crew.

CETTIGHE, April 6. The blockade of the Montenegrin seaport of Antivari was definitely established on Saturday. Eight foreign warships, representing the European Powers, formed a semi-circular bar before the harbour. The fleet is composed of three Austrian, two Italian, one British, one German and one French warship.

PARIS, April 6. A despatch from Belgrade, says that some newspapers there have received advices from Cettinge announcing that Scutari has fallen, and that the Montenegrin and Serbian troops entered the city on Friday afternoon. The correspondent adds that the Serbian Government has received no official confirmation of these reports.

BOSTON, April 6. A strike of 2,200 telephone operators and electrical workers, connected with the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company's Metropolitan system is threatened. Members of the Boston Telephone Operators' Union, voted without dissenting voice to break off all negotiations with the Company, in connection with their demands for increased wages and the readjustment of hours. The vote on the question of striking was ordered to be taken on Monday.

NEW YORK, April 6. Flowers will be tossed upon the waters, where the Titanic went down, by three women, widowed by the disaster. This tribute will be paid at 2.15 a.m. on April 15th, the anniversary of the foundering of the ship by Mrs. Jacques Futrell, Mrs. Henry B. Harris, and Mrs. George Thorne. The three women plan to sail for Europe from Boston on April 12th. When the ship passes the approximate position, where the liner diverged head first to the bottom, they will sing "Nearer my God to Thee," as their flowers fall on the way. Several other women survivors may join the pilgrimage.

LONDON, April 6. Two suffragette fire-bombs were captured on Saturday morning red-handed, while setting fire to the new Grand Stand, on the Kelso Race Course in Scotland. Rags, saturated with petroleum, had been placed beneath the stand, and ignited, when the watchmen duty sprang out of their hiding place, and captured the creatures. The Grand Stand at Ayr Race Course, also in Scotland, was gutted by fire this morning, causing a loss of \$15,000. The usual placards were found. A considerable number of window breaking and telephone wire-cutting outrages were committed during the night throughout the country.

That Scene In the House.

Sir.—The scene in the House on Friday last is not calculated to add to the prestige of Sir Edward Morris in the country, and must indeed have weakened him somewhat in the minds of his own friends. Such disgraceful language as was indulged in by him on that day could only emanate from one who is deeply chagrined at the prospects of his party in the coming election, and who feels his day as Premier of this Colony is fast ebbing out. If such language was applied by an ordinary member of the House to another, the Chairman would quickly intervene and the individual using such epithets asked to withdraw; but because it was the great ROSS—(yes, that is what McGrath used to call him in days gone by)—MORRIS, who uttered the insulting words the Chairman sat idly by and did not call the offender to order. However, it is a satisfaction to know that the member insulted did not allow Sir Edward Morris to have all the say, and the way he handled the Rt. Hon. gentleman has been received with favor in the clubs of the city. Fact is, Sir Morris has been trying to bluff better men than himself for a number of years—and, now, seeing that his day is almost run, and his chance of getting more large fees about gone, he starts into insult where he cannot bluff, and by that means endeavours to cover up the wrong doing of himself and his friends. He is not likely to succeed, however, even though he may flout the Opposition regarding bringing down information which is vital to the public weal. After November next, if not before, Morris's doing will be brought under the limelight and "my people" will then behold their self-chosen sovereign in his true colors. Meanwhile, I have only to say that Sir Edward Morris is losing caste in his own district and he cannot count even on those who strenuously supported him in past elections. Can you wonder then that he is showing symptoms of that affliction commonly known as "swelled head"?

SOFIA, April 6. Contrary to expectation, the European Powers met the objections of the Balkan Allies to the terms of mediation originally proposed by making concessions designed to secure an immediate cessation of hostilities on the Balkan Peninsula. In a note presented to the Bulgarian Government to-day, the Powers proposed that the Thracian frontier should be formed by a line drawn from Mela on the Black Sea to Enos on the Aegean Sea, which would give Bulgaria both banks of the river Maritza. In accordance with their demands, it was also suggested that all financial questions, such as indemnity, etc., should be left to the decision of a technical commission to meet in Paris. The reply from the allied nations was, they accepted the condition of mediation proposed, subject, however, to reservations which practically repudiated the proposed terms.

LONDON, April 6. The Standard says that by a jealously guarded secret invention the British Navy may, it is claimed, be protected from aerial attack. The inventor, Arthur Jenkins, is an Englishman, and Managing Director of the Dailton, Kansas Gulf Railway. He told a Standard reporter that he believes the discovery will banish fear of aircraft dropping bombs on warships. Jenkins says that he has written a book on the subject, which he has tested the invention, and he alleges, were convinced of its epoch-making qualities. Jenkins, it is asserted, has not approached the subject from a viewpoint of financial gain. He is an Englishman, all through, and his invention is for British ships only. Other Powers are anxious to get the secret. Secret service men on behalf of the German and Russian Governments approached him asking him to name his own price.

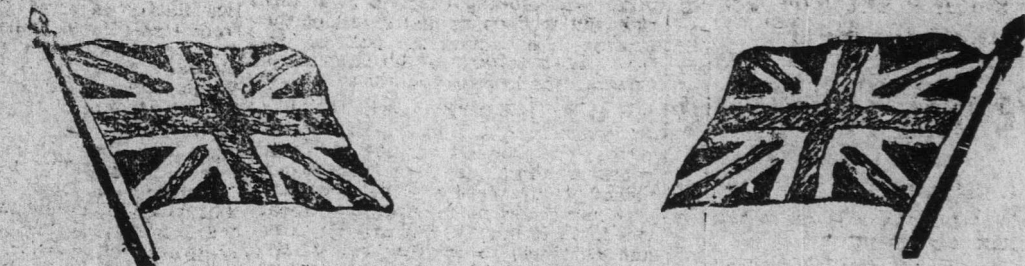
