Recruiting for Reserve Force.

To-day recruiting for the reserve force of the Newfoundland Regiment commences and from what we can gather there is much enthusiasm being displayed and a goodly number will likely offer themselves at the Recruiting Office to-night. We have no doubt that those in charge will have little trouble in getting the men required. The trouble will arise in connection with the facilities for training and especially in the smaller outports. The Committee in charge will face the problem and overcome the difficulties as they occur. In August and September, the problem of training was simpler. Weather conditions were such that a camp could be formed at Pleasantville and another at the Range on the Southside, and the training of the men could go on day by day. The course to be pursued now is for the city men to have drill three nights a week and also to have training with Morris tubes in the brigade armouries, and when shelters are erected at the firing points of the range to have regular target practice. This is probably the best that can be done for the present, but it is obviously much more imperfect than the training afforded the first contingent at Pleasantville, whereas there will be a much larger preparation of the new volunteers who have not had the advantages of brigade training which twothirds of the 1st contingent had before enlisting. As to the outports, the intention is to get as many enrolled as possible, and then to take up the problem of training, on the lines of sending a drill instructor to any large outport where fifty recruits can be gathered together. It is obviously desirable to bring as many men together at central points to facilitate training. To do this, men will have to give up work they do during the winter. This difficulty might be overcome and means afforded to get warm cloth-
