Your Boys and Girls.

Just how to give baby the morning bath will doubtless be welcomed by many young mothers. Bring the little one in to be bathed one half hour before feeding time and as near nine in the morning as possible. Lay him on your knees with his feet toward the bowl, and before he is undressed wash and wipe his face, hands and ears.

Now turn the baby until his head is over the bowl, supporting the neck and head with the left hand and resting his feet in your lap. Add cold water to that in the bowl until it is just warm; now put soap on the wash cloth and rub the little head until there is a good lather. Then rinse with plenty of water. Dry with the towel and lay him again in your lap.

Now add warm water to the bowl, remove the baby's clothes and soap him thoroughly. Cover him with the bath apron and add cold water to the tub until the water is comfortable to your elbow. Uncover the baby, slip your arm under his head, and while supporting his neck on your wrist, hold him firmly under his left arm at the shoulder. Grasp both ankles with your right hand, and lower him gently, then let him enjoy himself for five or ten minutes, then carefully lift him on your lap the same way you put him in.
