In December, 1916, which was the first time the vomen exercised the franchise, the people voted the government liquor the record vote being: Against-95,- 3 Joints, with extra top 246; For-23,666.

As a result of the vote the legislature enacted the Saskatchewan Temperance Act, which prohibited the sale of liquor in the prevince except for medicinal, scientific, manufacturand sacramental nurnoses. With the ban on importation by Federal orders-in-council under the War Measures Act, Saskatchewan was for a time bone dry, but this order was rescinded and from January 1, 1920, until Feb. 1, 1921, it was again possible for individuals to import into the province from other provinces or from outside Canada, liquor for beverage

purposes. Following a decision of the legislature in the 1919-20 session and subsequently the Federal Government, another plebiscite was submitted to the people of the province on Oct. 25, 1920, to decide for or against the importation of intoxicating liquor. The result of the vote was: Dry-86,949; Wet -55,259. As a result of this vote a Federal order-in-council was passed prohibiting importation into Saskatchewan after February 1, 1921, and the province became legislatively

hone dry once again. In the meantime a commission of three with R. E. A. Leech of Regina as chairman, was set up to administer the Saskatchewan Temperance Act, to provide for the distribution of liquor for legitimate purposes and to see that the Act was not violated. This commission is still operating.

There still existed in the province however, a number of export liquor houses and it was contended by the dry forces that these institutions were responsible for liquor leaking into illegal channels within the province. Following representation by the Saskatchewan legislature, federal legislation was invoked to abolish these places and the last was closed

in December 1922. Since that time two efforts have been made by the Moderation League of Saskatchewan to bring into operation a system of government coutrol. In the winter of 1922-23 backed by a substantial petition they asked for the establishment of such a sysmined by popuar vote, so far as the government was concerned. The majority of the distinguished guests will sail for Quebec on July 26 and on their arrival they will be welcomed by representatives of the government of Quebec and by the Rector and officers of Laval University. They will continue to Montreal by

One section of the delegates will inspect Montreal harbor on August 5 and they will be entertained at luncheon by the Montreal Harbor Commission. A second party will make an excursion to Cedar

The trip through the province of Quebec has been extended to three days at the suggestion of D. H. Hanna chairman of the transpotation committee, in order to eliminate night travelling and permit full enjoyment of the scenic beauties of the St. Lawrence route. This will also enable many of the savants to deliver public addresses in Quebec and Montreal. A party of English engineers who are particularly interested in hydroelectric power will inspect the de-

velopment along the St. Lawrence river, as the guests of R. S. Lee, Montreal engineer, with whom the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission is co-operating. They will reach Canada in advance of the main party and will examine all points along the route to Lake Ontario where there are power stations and where hydro-electric development is proposed. Shawinigan Falls will come in for special consideration, likewise the proposed deep waterway to the sea.

### Conditions in Denmark

MONTREAL, Que., June 17 (Can. Press)—J. E. Bogild, Consul-General for Denmark here, furnishes the following summary of economic conditions in that country for the month of April:

Compared with March 1923 the Danish Trade balance for the month of March 1924 shows a decided improvement, exportations amounting to \$29,000,000 against importations to the amount of \$33,000,000. Excess of imports over exports amount thus to \$4,000,000 whereas for the month of March 1923 excess of imports over exports amounted to over \$5,000,000. For the first three months of 1924 excess of imports over exports was \$6,600,000, whereas during the same period in 1923 imports exceeded exports by \$17,000,000

In March 1924 the agricultural exports from Denmark had the following approximate value:

Butter .. .. 2,444.6 tons The increase in quantity of the agricultural export from Denmark during April has, however, been acprices as is usual at this time of the year, and further the fall in the sterling value in Denmark has lowered the net profits to the Danish

During the month of April there has been a decided improvement in the employment market in Denmark, the percentage of unemployed at the end of April being only 9.3% against 11% at the end of April, 1923.

Owing to the increase in the value of the Danish Kroner, the Danish wholesale price index fell during the month of April from 228 to 225. The improvement in the Danish exchange during April, when dollars fell from 6.05 Kroner to 5.94 Kroner is due partly to the efforts of the Government exchange commis-
