A Dirty Bird

Who is the individual desirous of fouling his own nest, or what is equally despicable, who cracks a joke in the outside world at the expense of his own countrymen?

The following taken from the Montreal Star of the 23rd instant makes it clear that there is in our midst "a dirty bird," or one whose sense of propriety is so deficient that he does not hesitate to hold the country up to ridicule, and make the citizens appear to be a bunch of "reds" lacking in the respect due to the representative of His Majesty.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., CITIZENS PARADE.

5,000 Went By Election and Call on Governor and Premier.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 23.—(Special Star Cable)—A public meeting held at the Casino Theatre last night passed resolutions calling upon the Governor to grant the demand of the citizens for a by-election at St. John's East, then proceeded around the Government House grounds and called at the Premier's residence, where they voiced their demand in an orderly but determined manner.

When the parade reached the Government grounds it found the gates closed, police on guard and all lights in the grounds and governor's residence shut off. The crowd was restrained from entering by same leadership. When the crowd approached the gates were also turned off.

Five thousand citizens were in the parade. Strong condemnation of the Governor was openly expressed. Premier Monroe and Speaker Fox arrived by Rosalind yesterday and got a frigid reception. Public feeling against the Governor and executive is becoming intense.

Returning, the crowd packed the Casino and called on Sir Michael Cashin, who addressed the meeting, vigorously raking the Governor and Premier.

Obviously a bitter opponent of the Government, this individual promises soon to prove a very undesirable supporter of the party whose interests for the moment he prefers to espouse.

The Canadian Elections

Indefinite as the final result of the Canadian elections promises to be from the returns in the despatch, the Liberal party has received a severe blow in the defeat of a large number of the ministers of the late Government including the Prime Minister, Mr. Mackenzie King.

The maritime provinces have declared almost solidly for the Conservatives; in Ontario and British Columbia similar results have been obtained, while the middle provinces, discarding the Progressive banner, have joined forces in almost equal numbers with the Conservatives and Liberals.

The Province which has as usual been the most decisive factor in the fight is Quebec, when only four out of the 69 seats have voted Conservative.

The deadlock which results is most unsatisfactory from every standpoint, and the only alternative would appear to be another election.

Of the women candidates, Mrs. Agnes McPhail, Progressive candidate in Ontario South East seems to have been the only one elected.

The rapidity with which the returns are available in Canada is a matter of which we in this

country should take notice. Here, owing to the antiquated method of counting, the returns are unnecessarily slow in coming in, and it is quite time that a more up to date system was introduced.

The latest standing of the parties will be found in the noon day message.

Another Victim of the Storm

A gloom of sadness was cast over Doting Cove, Fogo District, on Friday last when Mrs. Stephen Abbott of that place perished in the storm. The unfortunate woman with Mrs. Wm. Rogers, left their home to go partidgeberry picking, but were caught in a storm which came on a few hours later and became separated. Mrs. Rogers reached her home safely and the other lady did not arrive a search was instituted immediately. All that night the people of the settlement scoured the woods armed with guns and lanterns, but no trace of the missing woman was found until 10 o'clock Sunday morning, when her body was discovered in the bushes alongside a large rock. Deceased was about 54 years of age and leaves to mourn a husband, two sons and one daughter to whom much sympathy is expressed.
