SUCCESSFUL ART EXHIBITION

Calgary is fortunate in having amongst its residents an artist of the capabilities of Miss Maud Colclough, who held a very delightful little exhibition of her paintings in the assembly room of St. Hilda's college, on Saturday afternoon.

ARTISTIC SIMPLICITY-A truly

interesting qualities.

The range of subjects chosen by the artist was fairly comprehensive—marine, landscape, genve and portraits. and excellent taste, and delicate Subdued tones, a grey and cloudy sky, the breeze rustling through the soft green of olive trees, growing on hill sides in Portugal, the faded shawl French peasant woman, would seem to appeal more strongly to the artist than the brighter hues of nature. There are, however, a few paintings in which she had green expression to the lighter tones and shown an appreciation of brilliant coloring. The portrait of a "Young Swiss Girl," in bright, yet soft blue dress and fluted white cap, with her lan full of vellow darfodils, is a note of color that immediately arrests the attention.

There is a study of still life that is warm and rich—the gray of the pewter jug and the burnished tint of the copper pan, with the bright-hued tomatoes within and beside it. A small canvas of a sumset is striking in its contrast of dense masses of somber, vineclad hill-sides, with the Palace of Cintra, the country residence of the King of Portugal, standing out strong-ly against the stormy brilliance of the

There are some interesting studies of the Portuguese cathedral of Belem, "San Geronimo," showing the massive pillars, Moorish in character—the stained glass windows, in which blues actress wife of the millionaire, who had started a suit against her husband for divorce. MOST interesting discussion the proposed Registration bill for nurses followed the read-ing of a paper by Miss Nan-ton at the Alberta Association of Nurses' convention held in the tion of Nurses' convention held in the library yesterday afternoon. The convention which should have started in the morning was postponed till 2 p.m. and was attended by members of the profession from the city and Edmonton. Miss Nanton in her paper pointed out how nurses without post-graduate training taking positions of trust, and making mistakes, the public laid these mistakes, not at the door of the these mistakes, not at the door of the these mistakes, not at the door of the individual alone, but of the entire profession. She quoted one such nurse, who on being asked where she had trained, said: "O, I have no training, gagement of a lady supervisor the I am better than a trained nurse. the legislative committee to decide. Summer Diarrhoea Infectious. A very interesting paper was read-by Dr. Pirie on summer diarrhoea in children, which, he pointed out, was most infectious, insisting that the child should be immediately isolated child should be immediately isolated until completely recovered. He gave reasons and remedies, pointing out that in bottle babies hairs from the cow, unclean utensils and improper care of the milk were usually the cause, and suggested that children should not be taken for automobile drives, steamboat cruises, or raliway travels, but should be kept unexcited, cool and sensibly clad.

Special emphasis was laid by the Special emphasis was laid by the doctor on the purchase and care of milk, and he added that difficult as it might seem to obtain just what was wanted in purity, if women insisted sufficiently, milk sellers would be wise enough to conform to requirements.


