WINNIPEG MARKET REDUCES PRICES BY FORTY PER CENT

Market Opened Two Weeks Ago in Winnipeg Has Effected a Tremendous Reduction in Prices of Market Truck, and Increased Supply; Comparison With Calgary Prices

TWO weeks ago the city of Winnipeg opened a public market with great eclat and ceremony. The Premier was present, and a number of notable men gave addresses. The Winnipeg market is achieving success, and is very well patronized by the women of the city.

Prices have been out in half. Within two weeks, the prices of all kinds of vegetables have been reduced by 40 per cent. to the consumer, while the price to the producer has in many cases increased, by the elimination of the profits of the middleman.

SHY CLUB WOMAN LOSES NERVE BEFORE HEALTH BOARD MEETING

"Cold Feet" Results in Failure to Obtain Request; Dr. Mahood Advises the Women to Press Their Influence at the City Hall

"SHE got cold feet" Dr. Mahood, medical health officer, addressing the Business Women's club, summed up the reasons for the failure of the board of health to recognize the necessity of passing a bylaw providing for the proper dressing of poultry for sale in Calgary, as requested by a representative of the committee of public health of the Local Council of Women.

"The delegate sent by the committee came down to the meeting of the board of health, but before the meeting began she got nervous and she wrote out her request on a little bit of paper and handed it to me to present to the board. They read it and said they would think it over, and that's all that happened. We didn't hear any more from the lady."

Business Women Should Ask. The doctor advised the Business Girls' Club to send a strong delegation to the board of health, in support of the proposed bylaw for chairs for women in stores and shops, and to strengthen their arguments by resolutions of endorsement as well as by the presence of as many women as could be interested.

If you want this bylaw, you must show that you want it. You should not be afraid to ask for what you want. Don't get 'cold feet' and blame me for lack of interest," urged the doctor.

The Business Women's Club is preparing to accept the doctor's advice and to send a strong delegation to the board of health and later on, to the city council.

Women Will Be Bolder. The Committee of Public Health may also take further action to secure the needed bylaw governing the dressing of poultry, on which the board of health has so far taken an indifferent stand. At present, poultry is brought to Calgary with the entrails and crop in the carcass, and frequently cases of ptomaine poisoning result. It is also an economic loss as the consumer is compelled to pay 25c to 30c per lb. for entrails which are not in any way useful and which spoil the meat.

The committee of public health requested that a bylaw be passed compelling vendors of poultry to remove entrails and crops from the poultry immediately after killing, and to dress poultry for the Calgary market in such a manner that it will be in a healthy condition when sold to the consumer, as in other Canadian cities.

CONSUMERS' LEAGUE WILL PRESENT EIGHT REQUESTS FOR IMPROVEMENT OF MARKET

Twice a Week Street Car Service, Market Tickets, Short Lease on Stalls, a Market Master, Woman Superintendent, the Barring of Horses

The meeting of the city council tonight the Consumers' league will present eight requests for market improvements.

The women are asking: (1) That all street cars run to the market twice a week, on the mornings of Tuesdays and Saturdays.

(2) That the city street railway department issue market tickets at reduced fares.

(3) That stalls be leased by the month instead of for a period of six months, and that leases be forfeited where stalls are not used.

(4) That a competent market master be appointed.

(5) That a woman superintendent be appointed to supervise the sanitation and cleaning of the building.

(6) That stalls be arranged in the centre of the market for supplies which farmers' wives might require to purchase.

(7) That the market be painted either white or grey, every three months.

(8) That horses be not allowed to enter the market building.

Women Criticize. Although the market experiment on Saturday was a success, much criticism of the accommodation and arrangements was made by the women patrons. The presence of horses within the market building was adversely commented on by all sides. Pleading to the market day, Marketmaster Wells and Mr. Taggart had taken the market with the market and some of the stalls were not clean.
