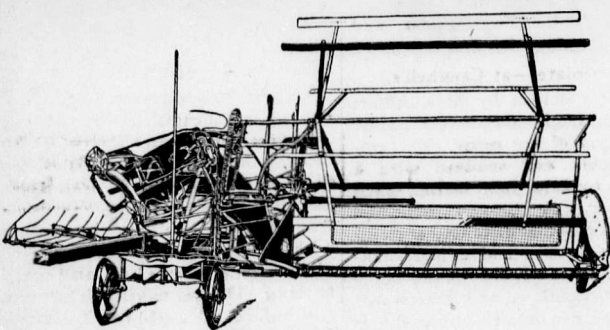

SOME TIPS ON SHOES.

Boots or shoes, however damp, will
polish in a few minutes if a drop or
two of paraffin oil is added to the
blackening. This also prevents the lea-
ther from cracking.

If new shoes will not take on a
polish, rub them over with half a
lemon and leave until thoroughly dry.

If a boot or shoe pinches in any
particular part, a cloth wrung out of
very hot water and laid over the
spot while the shoe is on the foot
will expand the leather and remove
the pinch.
