Town Council.

The above body met on Wednesday evening of last week, all the members were present, the mayor presiding.

After routine, a committee of the whole drafted the different committees which resulted as follows—

That Waterworks capital and Electric Light capital account be a committee composed of the whole council and shall be called a special committee with the mayor as chairman.

That No. 3 committee consist of Caron as chairman; Price vice; Nairn and Pierce.

That No. 2 committee consist of McKenney as chairman, Pierce, vice; Price and Backhouse.

That No. 1 committee consist of A. H. Backhouse as chairman; Nairn as vice; Caron and McKenney.

That in accordance with the wishes of the fire department, the name of David Cline be added as a member.

That the names of Andrew Murray and William J. Youell be inserted in by-law No. 444, as auditors, with a salary of \$25.

That W. B. Purdy be appointed a member of the Local Board of Health.

That Moses Leeson be appointed a trustee of the Aylmer Collegiate Institute.

That James Cann be appointed the assessor.

That Thomas Wooster be appointed a member of the Free Library Board.

That John A. McCausland be the collector.

That the Court of Revision of the town be held on May 28th, 1901, and that the mayor, Backhouse, Nairn, Pierce and McKenney be committee for same.

Mr. Nairn gave notice of motion that after this the public school trustees be elected at the same time as the municipal officers.

Committees No. 1 and No 2 made no report.

Committee No. 1 reported and recommended payment of the following accounts: J. A. McCausland, election, \$14; E. A. Miller, election, \$14; J. Bradley, election, \$14; J. Bradley, making lists, \$5; Dr. Kingston, timber, \$3; J. Bradley, postage, \$15; Mrs. O'Neil, meals, band, \$5.25; G. Seers, meals, band, \$2.25; Wabash R. R., \$1.55. Passed as read and the council adjourned.

BRUIN MEETS A TRAP GUN.

Farmer Shuck's Plan Right in Theory, but Dangerous For His Pigs.

The black bear of the Alleghenies is nothing if not a humorist. While his days are usually few and full of trials he makes the most of them, often to the chagrin of his lord and master, man. His appetite for young pork is often his undoing, but there are some smart bears who manage to catch a shoot or two once in a while without coming to grief.

Farmer John Shuck, who lives away back in the mountains, makes a business of raising hogs. A year or so after he started in the business all the bears within a radius of 100 miles had heard of it. At least that is what Shuck thinks. At any rate Shuck's young pigs began to disappear at an alarming rate from an inclosure which he deemed impregnable. At first he did not understand it. Then a friend suggested bears.

Full of the bear theory Shuck loaded a shotgun with slugs lay in wait for his enemies. Six nights he sat up without result, and on the seventh, when, tired almost to death, he went to bed, two of his pigs disappeared. Then he thought of a trap gun.

Shuck's trap gun was an elaborate affair, calculated to kill everything within a radius of ten miles when it went off. It was loaded with slugs to the muzzle and pointed at the open door of the sty, where, he reasoned, any sensible bear would enter. A string across the door provided the necessary exploding arrangement.

After setting the trap the first time Shuck went to bed confident of having bear meat for breakfast. About midnight he heard the gun go off. Rising hastily, he hurried to the sty and arrived in time to see the favorite of his flock disappear, personally conducted by a large black bear. With his customary curiosity Bruin had sniffed at the gun before he ventured into the sty. A paw caught the string near the trigger, exploded the trap without harm to the pig. Unfortunately the buckshot tore through the sty, killing four pigs and driving the remainder out of the sty. Bruin caught one of the fugitives as it came out and scamped off with a supper besides. Shuck abandoned the use of trap guns as bear destroyers.

THE DEAD.

The Duke of Broglie died at Paris at 8.55 o'clock Saturday evening.

M. Paul Jules Barbier, the French dramatic author and the librettist of "Faust" and many other well-known operas, died in Paris on Thursday. He was born in Paris March 8, 1825.

A person who has done business in New York as a man for the past thirty years under the name of Murray H. Hall, died on Thursday. The secret came out just before she died. Her daughter, a young woman who had lived constantly with her, would hardly believe it, and none of her hundreds of acquaintances and business friends suspected her sex. She was very profane.

The death is recorded at Egremont Township, Grey County, of Mrs. W. Morrison, sr., aged 102 years and 14 days. It is stated that when in her 101st year Mrs. Morrison milked the cows regularly. She was born in Howsliack, Lanark County, Scotland, where she was married on June 13, 1827. She came to Canada 30 years later, and took her residence in Egremont in 1859. She had eight children, five sons and three daughters. One hundred and forty-seven descendants survive her.
