THE WEATHER PROPHET.

Toronto, Oct. 20—11 p.m.—A disturbance which was just apparent near the New Jersey coast last night has moved northwest.

The storm center is now in Vermont and rain and moderate gales prevail in the St. Lawrence valley and Maritime Provinces. The weather has been mostly cloudy and showery in the lake region and dry and mild in Manitoba and the northwest territories.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 24°-35°; Winnipeg, 20°-34°; Toronto, 40°-50°; Montreal, 38°-48°; Quebec, 40°-49°; Halifax, 48°-50°.

Local temperatures—Highest, 55°; lowest, 46°.

Toronto, Oct. 21—1 a.m.—The indications for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region foretell the possibility and as far east as Belleville are fresh to strong westerly winds; fair weather; stationary or a little lower temperature.

Ongeode Hall Echoes.

Re Sarnia Oil Company—Judgment upon appeals by the Imperial Oil Company and John S. Nesbitt from a report of the local judge at Sarnia upon a reference to him to wind up the company. The appeals were on the ground that the reference should not have accepted Gen. Alger as a purchaser of the property of the company, and that the tender of one Englehart or of the appellant Nesbitt should have been accepted. There was on the 19th August last an unsuccessful attempt to sell by auction, when the highest offer, \$5,700, fell short of the reserve bid. The mortgages were then empowered to sell by tender, subject to the judge's approval, by order of 24th August last, the tenders to be deposited by noon on 4th September. No tenders being received, the time was extended to the 12th September at 5 p.m. Only one tender was then in, by Englehart, offering \$2,000. The judge waited till the arrival of the afternoon train, due at 4:40, which was on that day late, and by 5:30 two other tenders were received, one by McColl for \$10,000 and one by Englehart for \$10,015. Upon these being opened, McColl, who was acting in the interests of General Alger, one of the largest beneficiaries under the Buffalo Trust Company's mortgage, handed in a tender by Alger for \$2,500. The judge took no action then, but directed the other tenders to be notified of what had taken place, and upon all appearing before him on a subsequent day he accepted the highest tender, that of Alger. The learned chancellor holds that the policy of the court is not against the course taken by the master, and that the justice of the case was served by it; also that General Alger was not precluded from bidding. Appeals dismissed with costs to the respondents and the liquidator. W. R. Meredith, Q.C., for the appellants, the Imperial Oil Company; Hon. J. C. O.C. for the appellant Nesbitt, E. R. Cameron (London) for the Buffalo Trust Company and General Alger; D. MacMillan (London) for the liquidator.
