## CRISPI'S COLLAPSE.

The Event Considered as One of Grave Importance.

Press Comments on Its Cause and Ef fect—The African Question—A
Potent—Faction in Euro-

Rome, Feb. 2.—The vote by which the Italian Ministry was defeated was 186 to 125. In presenting the Spirit Taxes Bill Prime Minister Crispi urged that the taxes proposed by the Government were positively necessary to prevent Italy from falling again to the servile condition she was in, as regards foreign powers, in 1874.

Berlint, Feb. 2.—In political circles in Berlin the news of Crispi's downfall was received with regret, though with composure, as it is believed his fall will not affect the Driebund or Italy's foreign policy.

London, Feb. 2.—The Standard says the fall of Crispi is an event of the gravest significance, but it will not exercise the remotest influence on Italy's foreign policy or the solidity of the Driebund. A bridle will have to be imposed on the insane and inexplicable waste of Italian money in Africa, which we fully believe was the main ingredient of the irritation that has resulted in Crispi's fall. It is not in Italy alone that Lord Salisbury's prediction as to the influence that Africa would er-ort in European politics is coming true. The Oportor revolt was caused by popular vexation with the failure of the Government to compel England to forego her just claims in the African convention. Despite our

Despite our greater strength we leave ambitious dreams regarding Africa to chartered companies, and if the other powers are wise they will follow our example.

The Times, commenting on the Italian crisis, says: "A dislike of heavy military and naval expenditure would be a more permanent force in Italian politics were it not so clear that an attitude of hostility to the Drielund and closer intimacy with France would involve even nearer unity and imply an equally elaborate preparation for the possibilities of war. When this is realized it will, we think, be time to pause before discarding Crispi."

The Times' Rome correspondent says: "I do not believe any stable combination is possible to oppose Crispi who will be stronger than ever on returning to power. He refused positively to enter any combination at present."

The Figaro publishes an interview with the Pope in which his Holiness is quoted as saving: "The French Conservatives saw that such a thing was possible and they should establish something better than a republic, otherwise they should adhere to the republic, which then would be as fairly good as they choose to make it. To support a good renublic is to fight against a bad one. The formation of a Catholic party in France is an agreeable dream, but it is a dream."

THE IRISH PROBLEM.

McCarthy Ropemi of a Solution—Rumors of a Settlement.

London, Feb. 3.—Justin McCarthy, speaking at Liverpool yesterday on the Irisin question, said that if the minority would not yeld the majority might as well disband. He was prepared, he said, to accept any settlement making for peace and union. The prospects of an agreement heling reached were hopeful. The Imperial Parliament must settle the land question before or concurrent with the home rule question, or never settle it at all. The Irish were quite competent to reorganize the constabulary as a civil force.

In the lobbies of Parliament last night the rumor was revived that the settlement supposed to have been made with regard to the split in the Irish party leaves Mr. McCarthy in the chair, Messrs. Parnell and O'Brien going to America for the police and deal with the land question, if it is still unsettled; but they insist that the right of veto shall be reserved to the Imperial Parliament, as in the bill of 1886. Both sections of the Irish party will agree to this, and Mr. Parnell will temporarily retire and go to America.
