HORSMAN-MCDONALD CLAIMS

Against the Street Railway Company
Settled for \$700 and Costs.

The board of arbitrators, chosen to assess and apportion the amount of damages sustained to Thomas Horsman, tenant, and Jerry McDonald, owner of the Riverside Hotel, as a result of the erection of the street railway bridge on Dundas street, and the crossing of the street grade on the west side of the bridge, completed their labors on Saturday, when an agreement was made between the parties. By agreement with the village, the company assumed all responsibility of any disability that might arise from the construction of the bridge. The company proffered \$500 in settlement of both parties' claims. Mr. Horsman wanted \$250 of this, and as Mr. McDonald claimed that he could not repair the damage short of \$1,000, he refused to accept. His offer to take \$500 was accepted, and the company paid to Mr. Horsman \$200 more, together with the costs of the arbitration, amounting to about \$150. J. M. McEvoy, for Mr. Horsman; Thomas Purdon, for Mr. McDonald; E. R. Cameron, for London West, and I. F. Hellmuth, for the street car company.

Lady Aberdeen.

Visit of Her Excellency to London on Wednesday.

Official Announcement of the Ceremonies Attending It.

The following information regarding the visit of Lady Aberdeen to London on Wednesday is supplied the hospital fair management. Victoria, B.C., (this Monday) morning, Lady Aberdeen expresses herself as very gratified by all the plans made to welcome her when she comes to open the hospital fair on Wednesday next, adding that Major Denison, lately quartered in London, will be with her, and will act as A. D. C. in attendance. Her excellency and party will arrive at the C. P. R. station at 11:25 a.m. Mrs. Labatt will, in her own carriage, convey Lady Aberdeen to the hall, followed by Mrs. English, first past president of the Local Council of Women; Mrs. Tilley, as a member of the executive of the National Council (for Dominion King's Daughters), and Mrs. Yarles, as acting president of the hospital fair. Dr. Roome, and perhaps some other medical men who may accompany him to the station, will welcome Dr. Worcester, and bring him to the city hall for the opening of the fair and to lunch. The ladies hope that a large number of the city doctors and the hospital trust will honor them and help their cause by their personal presence on the occasion, in token of their sympathy with this effort on behalf of a provision for the sick children of London. At 3 p.m. her excellency will proceed to the rooms of the Art Club to inspect their beautiful exhibition of decorated china. Her excellency has always taken a particular interest in the art and other educational societies affiliated to the National Council; therefore it is a very fortunate coincidence that the Art Club of London, in affiliation with its Local Council, should be holding its annual exhibition at this special moment.

Killed Instantly.

Wm. Spice, a Farmer, Struck by a Pottersburg Trolley Car.

On Dundas Street Near the City Limits—The Man Killed, the Rig Smashed to Atoms and the Horse Uninjured—First Trolley Victim.

The first fatality on the London Electric Street Railway in the city limits happened about 6:15 on Saturday, on Dundas street east, a few feet inside the city limits, when William Spice, a farmer, 64 years of age, and residing on the town line between Nisour and London, near Thorncliffe, was almost instantly killed.

Just how the lamentable affair happened will probably not be known until after the inquest, at 12 o'clock today. The facts, as far as could be learned, are these: Mr. Spice came to the city on Saturday for the purpose of inspecting and purchasing a feed cutter. Towards evening he drove towards home, and paid a visit to his son Daniel at 480 Charlotte street, to see his daughter-in-law, who is ill. He left his son's place about 4 o'clock, and turned east on Dundas street.

On the other side of Eva street the horse and its driver turned towards the north side of the road to avoid a mud hole. It is supposed, and attempted to cross the track, the same time an approaching trolley car, No. 54, in charge of Motorman David Break and Conductor James Fitzgerald, was backing towards Pottersburg. The collision must have been a fearful one, as the slender vehicle and its occupant were crushed beneath the fair ground. The rig was literally smashed to atoms, and Mr. Spice sustained several cuts on the head, any one of which would have caused death. There were only three passengers in the car at the time—two men and one woman. The unfortunate victim never spoke after being extricated from the debris and carried into the house of Mr. William Ferguson. The horse was uninjured. Dr. Moore was the first to arrive, then Dr. James MacArthur, and later Coroner Dr. Ferguson. A conveyance was sent for, but the body lay in the harness awaiting removal to Ferguson's morgue.

The deceased came to Middlesex at an early age, and had resided there all his life. His wife died four years ago. He leaves three sons and a daughter—William, an invalid son, at home on the farm; Daniel, who is employed at the chemical works, and Sarah and James, in the Northwest Territories. This is the second fatality since the advent of the street car in the Forest City. Some years ago William Philpew, a painter, was killed on Richmond street opposite Carling street, by a horse car. A man was also killed in London West by a trolley car before the system was introduced into the city.

Since the opening of the Pottersburg line the cars have been backed to the station from the fair grounds, where a "Y" is now being put in, which, it is expected, will be finished today. The place where the accident occurred is a dark spot, and the road is in bad shape.

In City Church Circles.

Rev. Canon Dann on Emotional Preaching.

Sunday School Anniversary of the Dundas Center Methodist Church.

Rev. Wm. McDonagh Denounces Dancing—"Pilgrim's Progress" at the Auditorium.

No Emotional Preaching.

Rev. Canon Dann preached a powerful sermon at St. Paul's Cathedral last night. People, he said, need not attend St. Paul's Cathedral in the expectation of having their emotions touched by the preacher. The sermons were presentations of the Gospel, designed to instill Christian truth and doctrine, and not to influence the emotions. The cathedral was a place of worship, not a place of preaching. Canon Dann dwelt on the beauty and significance of the Church of England service.

Dancing Denounced. Rev. Wm. McDonagh, formerly of London West, preached in the Askin Street Methodist Church yesterday. In the course of his sermon he said that dancing was one of the most contemptible of sins; that it was brutish animalism.

Stereoscopic Views at the Auditorium. Nearly 400 men were at the meeting in the Auditorium yesterday afternoon, when Rev. Robert Johnston presented stereoscopic views of Bunyan's "Pilgrim's Progress." In the series of views the pilgrim was taken as far as the wicket gate, and from that point in his journey.

Colborne Street Church Anniversary. Rev. Dr. J. S. Ross, of Brantford, conducted the anniversary services at the Colborne Street Methodist Church yesterday morning and evening, and on each occasion there was a large congregation present. Mr. Ross is an eloquent speaker, and a warm personal friend of many members of the church, having been one of the first pastors when service was held in the little brick building on Pall Mall street. Reference was made to the financial success of the church during the past year. The Ladies' Aid have paid off \$335 interest, and also purchased a parsonage lot for \$400. The collections at both services yesterday amounted to \$337, lacking but \$113 to wipe off the debt of the trustee board.

Indian Missions. Ven. Archdeacon Phair, superintendent of the Indian mission work in Rupert's Land, preached yesterday morning at St. James' Church, South London, and in the evening at St. George's Church, and on each occasion spoke of the important and growing work among the red men of the Northwest. Referring to the Indian hospital established a year and a half ago, he said 1,100 Indians had received outside treatment from the institution. A fund of \$2,000 is badly needed to continue the work.

The Sunday school anniversary of the High Street Mission was held yesterday afternoon. Rev. Richard Hobbs and Mr. W. H. Liddlecott gave interesting addresses.

Rev. Mr. Ritchie, who goes to Bolivia shortly as a special missionary, occupied the pulpit of the Talbot Street Baptist Church in the morning, and addressed the Adelaide Street Baptist congregation in the evening.

Rev. W. J. Clarke yesterday afternoon addressed the Thanksgiving open meeting at Wesley Hall of the First Methodist Sunday school, and Miss Inez Smith sang. A large number of visitors were present and much enjoyed the session.

Dr. Wood-Allen was announced to address a temperance meeting in the Askin Street Church yesterday afternoon, but owing to illness was unable to fill the engagement. Mrs. May Thornley spoke in her place. A collection was taken up in aid of the plebiscite funds.

The superintendent of the Colborne Street Methodist Sabbath school on Saturday received from Mr. Thomas Kent a check for \$50, which is a portion of the bequest of the late Isabella Kent, of which Mr. Kent is executor. The money is for the purchase of a library, or otherwise used for the benefit of the school.

Rev. J. W. Pedley, of the First Congregational Church, preached last night on "Belief." He was, he said, almost daily meeting people who claimed that it did not much matter what a man believed if he was sincere, and did what he thought right. Sincere men had aided in the work of the inquisition. It was of vital importance that the fundamental points of one's belief should be correct. A right belief of the character of God, the judge of all, and a right appreciation of the teachings of Christ must affect life's conduct.
