BASEBALL.
HAMILTON HAS A SAY.
The Hamilton Spectator says: "Now that Brantford has decided not to continue in the Canadian League, it is expected that representatives of the London, Guelph and Hamilton clubs will get together and arrange a new schedule of games. It is not known whether the games played so far will be counted or if a series will be arranged for the championship. Several days ago London talked of arranging a series of games with Guelph and Hamilton. Guelph, however, would sooner play with the Blues; but there is no disposition on the part of Hamilton or Guelph to freeze out London. It would be better to arrange a series between the three clubs, but Manager Sippl should be given to understand that London is not in a position to dictate terms, and must agree to a schedule that is fair to all the clubs."

As regards the above, it may be said in defense of London desires to freeze out nobody, but is merely acting from motives of self-preservation. It is impossible to arrange a three-club schedule on a paying basis, as two games a week must be played by each club to pay expenses. The rivalry between London and Guelph is keener than between Guelph and Hamilton, and any other club, and a series between the Leafs and Alerts would be mutually profitable, as both are better ball towns than Hamilton. "Things cannot go on as they are," said an officer of the Alert Club today. "We have no scheduled game until Sept. 5, and with a salary list of \$500 a month we cannot wait until then for a game. We would arrange exhibition games if we thought they would pay, but the people here will not patronize anything but a championship game. If we cannot secure a series with Guelph, I am afraid we must disband."

The Alerts play an exhibition game at Stratford on Wednesday with the Guelphs.

THE ARLINGTONS AT POINT EDWARD.

Badly Crushed.
Charles Davis May Lose the Use of His Arm.

An Accident in the East End—Caught Between Car Buffers.

Chas. Davis, an employee of the G. T. R., was the victim of an accident this morning which may cripple him for life.

About 6 o'clock this morning he was riding two freight cars on the track at the old race course in the East End, and was stooping between them. Some cars further up were being shunted. He did not see them moving towards those between which he was standing until they struck. Davis' left arm was resting on the drawhead and was caught squarely between the buffers. It was terribly crushed from the elbow to the wrist, the skin being stripped off and the bone broken in several places.

Dr. Drake was summoned and dressed the wound. Davis bore the pain manfully and walked home, though suffering intensely. It is feared that the arm may have to be amputated, or that he may lose the use of it. Davis is a married man.

Spending the Holiday.

The Whole Population Apparently Had an Outing.

Great Day at Springbank—Port Stanley Gets a Crowd—Excursions Well Patronized.

Civic Holiday in this city, from standpoints of weather and temperature, was a "beaut." It was a model day for sport of almost any kind, and both the ball match and the bicycle races drew large crowds. The gathering at the ball match was the largest seen this season, and in the afternoon another large crowd witnessed the bicycle races. The back streets of the city were practically deserted, save at meal hours.

From 6 o'clock till nearly noon the people were seen hustling along towards the depots and the boat, with their baskets heavily laden with provisions for the day. About 375 people went to Detroit via the different railroads. Over 400 people went to Sarnia, about 250 to Toronto, and 150 to the Falls. The business was distributed between the three railways.

Port Stanley was again besieged by a multitude of over 2,000 people from the city. The heights on Erie's shore presented a pleasing picture when the ground was spread with table-cloths every few feet, which were covered with the thousand and one things that a practical and good housewife is capable of preparing. The day was, if anything, a little cool, but the water was the right temperature for the bathers. The steamer Mount Clemens made special trips and was very patronized. The train service was good and splendid time was made. The last car reached home about 11 o'clock, with about 350 on board.

AT SPRINGBANK.

Yesterday a crowd at Springbank capped the climax. It was the largest Springbank ever saw. The street railway people deposited 15,046 people at the park during the day and evening, and all the afternoon 25,000 passengers. In the morning eight cars were put on with an eight-minute service, but in the afternoon the crowd swelled to such proportions that they stood at every corner awaiting the arrival of Springbank cars.

This necessitated placing 26 cars on the line, while the eight-minute service was maintained. The people came back and forth all day long. At the foot of Dundas street there was another jam to get on to the boat, which made every hour to accompany the crowd, and each time carried a heavy load of human freight.

All over the open grounds and under the trees were seated picnickers, who from all appearances enjoyed themselves immensely. In the nooks and corners under the apple trees the ladies and ladies took one another's pictures, which every now and then were interrupted by a shower of green apples, caused by a missile from the hands of some inconsiderate youth. There were apples galore. The boys knocked them down by the tushel. The ice cream parlor was taxed all day to its utmost capacity.

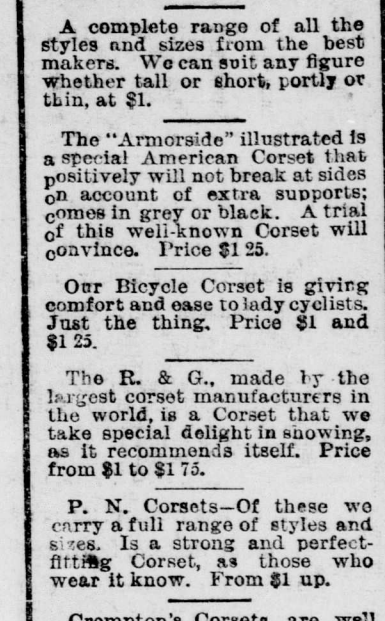
