Victory Well Earned.

Asylum Cricketers Defeat Their Hamilton Visitors

By the Narrow Margin of Seven Runs.

The London Bicycle Club's Weekly Run and Coming Race Meet—Various Sporting Events.

CRICKET

LONDON ASYLUM WINS.

The cricket event of the season in the western district—so much talked about by old cricketers and anticipated with so much pleasant expectancy by the local eleven—the two days' match between the Asylum and the Hamilton club—came off during the past two days on the Asylum ground. The weather throughout was everything that could be desired, being warm and dry with a cloudless sky, and the contesting teams were both in first-class condition. The home team was greatly strengthened by the addition of Rev. F. W. Terry, who is just now visiting his London friends during his holidays, and with this acquisition both teams seemed to feel that they had met friendly foes worthy of their best skill. Hamilton has so many years been the home of first-class cricket in Ontario, and the London men had so often accepted their true cricketing hospitality and experienced their supremacy at the noble game, that on the best possible footing, both from a cricket point of view and from the basis of personal regard.

The captain of the home team won the toss and elected to bat, and before the last wicket fell the Asylum team had 133 runs to their credit. Rev. Mr. Terry making 59, Dr. Beemer 23, W. A. Walker 14, D. J. Bacon 10, C. S. Hyman 11, Geo. England 14, and Dr. Ross 30. After luncheon the visitors went in and completed 138 runs, A. Gillespie making 10, K. Martin 14, F. G. Patterson 16, and Fleet 62, not out. There still being half an hour to spare before the time arranged for drawing stumps, the home eleven went in again and lost three wickets for 17 runs, thus leaving the Asylum Club 62 runs ahead, with three wickets down in the second inning, at the close of the first day's play.

On Thursday morning, soon after 10 o'clock, Dr. Beemer and M. A. Walker continued the second inning of the Asylum eleven, but the whole team was put down for the small score of 50. Mr. Walker being unfortunately disabled when he was scoring safely and rapidly. The visitors soon began their second inning with a score of 135 runs to make to win, and at this time, as, indeed, at any period of the match, the chances seemed about even in the minds of those who knew the comparative strength of the opposing teams. The visitors' inning, however, closed with a total of 127 runs, A. Gillespie making 50, A. Gillespie 20, and F. G. Patterson 15, not out, leaving the home team 7 runs ahead. The best of feeling existed throughout the play, and old cricketers among the spectators unite in saying that the match was one of the best witnessed in London for many years. Mr. Young performed the duties of umpire for Hamilton and Mr. R. Bayly, Q. C., for the Asylum club in a way entirely acceptable to both teams, and Mr. G. B. Sippi did the scoring. IN LABOR'S FIELD.

Decision of the Miners' Convention at Birmingham.

All Members of the Confederation To Be Called Out—Striking Miners—Types Quit Work—Gallagher Retracts His Confession.

LONDON, July 20.—The Miners' Confederation continued its conference at Birmingham to-day. It was decided to call out all the men who have not received notice of reduction. These men will be idle until the notice of reduction, when they will be allowed to return to work. Representatives of 149,000 miners voted in favor of the resolution to call out those miners of a federation who have been notified of a reduction in their wages. Delegates representing 101,000 men voted against the resolution. It is provided that the miners in question shall give notice to their masters of the termination of their contracts on the next "making up" day.

Winn, City, Kan., July 20.—A number of striking miners, together with a number of their wives, attacked the strippit miners in one of the mines near here this afternoon. A fight ensued, in which clubs, rocks and firearms were used. About 100 shots were fired and a number on both sides were injured. No one was killed.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 20.—At 1:30 o'clock this afternoon Patrick Gallagher, the one-eyed man, was taken to the penitentiary, Wright at his cell in the penitentiary. Gallagher said: "Warden, I have been in all night and wish to say to you now that the confession made by me yesterday was not a confession, and that I was dragged into it. I wish now to retract everything that was said in that confession, and wish you would send for the attorneys interested, as I will decline to sign the confession." The warden immediately notified District Attorney Burleigh and Attorney Potter. After three hours' talk with Gallagher, District Attorney Burleigh came out and said that Gallagher had declared under oath that every statement he made yesterday was absolutely false, and that Dempsey, Beattie and Davidson are guilty as indicted.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 20.—Organizer Hawkes, of Seattle, has ordered out the machine printers here on newspaper work. The demand \$24 per week for seven and a half hours on morning papers; \$23 50 for eight hours on evening papers, and submit a set of new rules for the machines. The proprietors say they will not submit, and will make Vancouver a non-union town first.

PLATTSBURG, Pa., July 20.—The Chattanooga Ore and Iron Company closed down to-day as did also the Crown Point Iron Mines and Iron Makers at Crown Point, on account of dullness in the iron trade. About 1,000 men are thrown out of employment.

TOLEDO, July 20.—The Milburn wagon works, employing 1,500 men, shut down yesterday, and we will be sent on a reduction of wages.

Mr. Moody Hires a Theater.

CHICAGO, July 20.—Evangelist Moody has secured possession of the Empire Theater for five weeks, and he has opened it for nightly Gospel meetings.

Fatal Explosion.

NEW YORK, July 20.—At 4:45 this afternoon a gas explosion occurred in the sweat band factory of J. D. Campbell, 211 Walworth street, Brooklyn, killing J. D. Campbell, Samuel K. Campbell (his son), John Weiss, 20 years old, and Jacob Weiss. Matthew Deering, 16 years old, was injured. The building was completely wrecked.

Murdered in View of His Family.

DATON, O., July 20.—Chas. F. Duerr, aged 41, a stenographer, was brutally murdered about 2 o'clock this morning while returning with his wife and children from a party. As they were about to cross a trolley bridge over Zelig ditch they found their way obstructed by three ruffians, who refused to step aside. Mrs. Duerr squeezed through with a baby carriage which she was wheeling, but her husband was knocked down with a stone and then stabbed through the heart. All the occurred within a stone's throw of his home and while his wife and children were near by. The murderers escaped.

We'll Stand the Storm.

MONTREAL, July 20.—A local paper has interviewed all of the bank managers in this city on the financial outlook in the United States on the recent failure, bank crashes, etc. The unanimous expression is that the repeal of the Sherman silver law will alleviate the troubles which it undoubtedly brought about. The opinion is given that the failure of the western banks will not affect Canada in any way whatever, and that the Dominion, outside of some losses in the larger cities by stock gamblers and jobbers, was never on a better financial basis. They state that with the present crop prospects Canada's outlook for the season is very bright.

THE DEPRESSION IN DENVER

Believed to Have Done Its Worst—Confidence Reviving.

DENVER, Col., July 20.—There will apparently be no more bank failures in Denver. The panic wore itself out yesterday with the failure of the People's, German and State National Banks. This morning in some of the banks money was going back into the vaults almost as rapidly as it was withdrawn during the past three days. The German, State and People's National could pay \$3 for \$1 if they could realize on securities. There may be a few commercial failures in the city within the next few days. It is believed that resumption of business will surely follow shortly.

The First National Bank at Canon City and Grand Junction, this State, failed to open their doors this morning.

Claims the \$1,000 Reward.

CHATHAM, July 20.—Sergeant Skirving, of this town, claims the \$1,000 reward offered for the capture of A. E. Wilson, the Hamilton murderer. He asserts that from information supplied by him Wilson was located by Detective Rogers, and has forwarded his correspondence in the matter to the Attorney General.
