IN LABOR'S FIELD.

Important Strike of Carpet Weavers
Inaugurated.

Philadelphia, Pa., July 9.—The threatened strike of power loom weavers in carpet weavers to secure an advance in wages of 7 1/2 cents was inaugurated here today, when the employees of a majority of the manufacturers in the district embraced in the jurisdiction of the Power Loom Weavers' Protective Association left their looms. This action was taken after the employers had refused the advance. The strike is the result of a conference held on May 28 by delegates from 62 mills, when it was decided to demand the union schedule of wages or go on strike. The district embraced in the strike is very large. A thousand employees who are dependent on the weavers are thrown out of work.

PRESBYTERY OF LONDON.

The New Missionary to Honan—In Re
Elders.

St. Thomas, July 10.—London Presbytery met here yesterday morning in Knox Church, the moderator, Rev. Geo. Sutherland, of Fingal, presiding. The commissioners to the General Assembly reported. The Presbytery arranged for the ordination of Rev. James Menzies, M.D., of Westminster, as missionary to Honan. The ordination takes place on Aug. 20 at 8 o'clock, the moderator presiding. Rev. Mr. Little, the pastor, to address the missionary, and Rev. Mr. Currie the congregation. Rev. Mr. Dewar, who is moderator of the congregation of Williams, is to report on the next regular meeting of the Presbytery as to the condition of that congregation.

Mr. M. Campbell, of Dutton, was recommended to Knox College as a student for the ministry.

Mr. Bayne, of Wallacetown, applied for the status of a catechist that he might undertake mission work in Muskoka during the winter months. The Presbytery agreed to entertain his application, and appointed subjects for examination.

Rev. Mr. McNeill reported leave to mortgage the new church property in Dunwich to the amount of \$2,000. The moderator was authorized to sign the application.

There was some informal expression of opinion of the members of the Presbytery given in answer to a question raised by Rev. Mr. Leitch, of Delaware. The consensus of opinion was that an elder coming to a congregation from another by certificate can only be received as a member, and cannot serve as an elder till he has been elected by the congregation he has newly entered, even though he may have been an elder in that same congregation in former years. Adjourned.

London and Environs

—The carriage and wagon workers of this city are talking of forming a union.

—George Sterling, brother of R. N. and C. Sterling, of this city, died recently in Chicago.

—The Salvation Army Ladies' Brass Band, under command of Capt. Dean, London, has taken Galt by storm.

—Mr. Frank Coles, of London, sang in the Catholic church at Bothwell on Monday, at the funeral of the late Mrs. Dillon.

—If you "don't care whether school keeps or not," all right, don't advertise; but if you do care, don't despise printers' ink.

—It was John H.—not Thomas—Webb, late of this city, who perished in the lively stable fire at Detroit, on Wednesday morning.

—Mr. Frank Plant, secretary of the Local Typographical union, has been chosen as a representative to the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress which meets in this city in September.

—The non-payment of wages case of Cyrus Northcott against Samuel C. C. Caradoc, occupied six hours of Squire J. B. Smith's time on Tuesday. Judgment will be given on Monday. The amount in dispute is \$18 32.

—The painters and decorators of this city have organized a union with a charter membership of 21. The list will remain open until Saturday, when a charter will be applied for from the International Union. Temporary officers have been chosen.

—A meeting of the Irish Benevolent Society was held in the Town Hall last night to consider a date and place for the annual picnic. A committee was appointed to confer with the authorities of the different railroads as to the time and route. The picnic will be held on or about Aug. 6.

—The wedding is announced on Feb. 18 last of George W. Yates, of the "Advertiser" editorial staff, and Miss Hattie I. H. Gardner, of this city. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. E. H. Savers, at the Presbyterian manse, Wilton Grove. The young couple have taken up their residence at 40 Wellington street.

Conductor Harry McBride, of the Stratford-Toronto run, had an unpleasant experience with a gang of ruffians at New Hamburg on Saturday. There were seven in the train, and along one of the crowd mounted the steps of the coach where Conductor McBride stood, and razor in hand, made a savage attack on him. The intruder and his pals were frightened by a revolver.

—A meeting of the Port Stanley Railway directors was held in Mayor Little's office yesterday afternoon, when tenders for the masonry in connection with the new bridges at Mill and Kettle Creek were opened. On a few tenders were received, and that of James A. McMahon, of St. Catharines, at \$5,587 70, was accepted, being the lowest.

The figures of all the tenderers were very close. A special committee, comprising Engineer DeGurse, of the L. E. and D. R. R., City Engineer Graydon, F. E. Leonard, and Wm. Bowman, will examine the contracts for the new bridges. If they prove satisfactory Mayor Little will be recommended to sign them. Secretary Kingston was requested to secure from the lessees of the road a detailed statement of what is required in the matter of terminal facilities in London and elsewhere. The members present were: Mayor Little, F. E. Leonard, Ald. Wm. Bowman, M. Maurel, Ald. Wm. Heaman, Engineers DeGurse and Graydon and City Clerk Kingston.

—At a meeting of No. 3 committee last night a letter from Robert McLean, secretary of the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association, was read. It stated that unless the fire limits bylaw was more strictly enforced, London would be placed in a lower class in the insurance schedule. City Engineer Graydon complained of a breach of the fire bylaw by W. Melburne, who erected a frame building at the corner of Richmond and Pall Mall streets without a permit. Both communications were laid over pending a full meeting of the committee. Thomas A. Browne's application for use of city hose in the main building during the fair was filed. Maurice Baldwin appeared before the committee and protested against a knock-off of \$50 in his street watering account. "It is done for

KNOX COLLEGE CHAIRS.

A rearrangement of chairs, as follows, has been provided for in Knox College, according to the Canada Presbyterian: I. A chair in New Testament work, comprising all questions relating to the New Testament, viz., the canon, the text, introduction, exegesis and Biblical theology; this chair has been assigned to Principal Caven. II. An Old Testament chair, to include similar questions; this will require a new professor. III. Prof. McLaren remains in charge of the chair of systematic theology. IV. Dr. Proudfoot has charge of his old subjects—homiletics, pastoral theology and church government. V. The fifth chair includes church history and apologetics, and this is a new professor will also be needed.

ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.

The coroner's jury which last night investigated the cause of the death of little Edward Wharton, who was killed on the C. P. R., near Colborne street on Tuesday evening, found that death was purely accidental. The train hands were entirely exonerated from blame, but the railway company were strongly urged to place watchmen at all the crossings between Adelaide street and the city station. The inquest was held at St. Stephen's hall, the coroner presiding. Coroner J. R. Brock and the following jury: Fred Keene (foreman), Wm. Payne, Edward Levington, James Jupp, Thomas Smith, Alford Barker, Jacob Smith, Wm. Johnston, Wm. Morrison, Robert Thomas, John Thomson, John H. Barrens, Robert Stewart, David Tripp and John Fuller. The account of the accident was given in yesterday's "Advertiser" as fully corroborated by the witnesses. The deceased, with several other boys, had been playing on the railway property, and stepped aside from the way freight passed up from the west. Young Wharton, it was shown, was in the act of picking up a pebble to throw at the freight, and was in a stooping position when struck by the express. Engineer John "Nixon" and Fireman Wm. Telford, of the passenger train, swore as to the usual signals being given and an endeavor being made to stop the train. This was impossible, but the train was going at such a slow rate that it was brought to a standstill before all the cars passed over the body. Mrs. Walls and Mrs. Morgan, whose children were playing with young Wharton, gave evidence complimentary to the train hands for general carefulness.

A WHEELMAN'S CLOSE CALL.

Toronto, July 10.—Art 2, Mason, head of the piano firm of Mason & Risch, had a narrow escape from death under the trolley on Wednesday night. He was riding a wheel, and turning onto Yonge street from Richmond was caught between two cars going in opposite directions. He was knocked over and fell on the guard of one of the cars, and was carried along for a number of yards. He escaped with a broken leg and a number of bruises. His bicycle curiously escaped injury.
