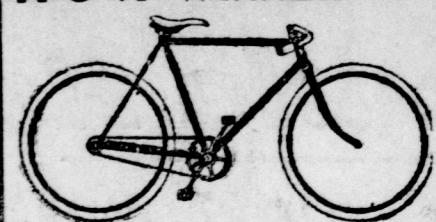

WATERWORKS REVENUE.

The water commissioners figure that the revenue for the year will be \$96,117 40. Of this sum \$15,351 40 is charged to the city, and the water consumers contribute \$78,000, leaving a surplus of \$96,727 40 over working expenses, or nearly \$1,000 less than last year.

LIBERAL MEETING AT COLDSTREAM.

Gilchrist, Toronto, will deliver addresses on horticultural subjects and answer questions relative thereto. A large attendance is desired.

ANOTHER HARPER MEMORIAL.

On the tragic death of Mr. A. H. Harper in December last, among the various bodies which took steps to commemorate his heroism were the Toronto University class of '95, to which he belonged, the Political Science Department and the Alumni Association of the university. It is proposed to combine the subscriptions received by each of these into a common fund to be devoted to some form of memorial, to be decided upon by the joint action of the various bodies.

HIRWEN JONES COMING.

The Halifax Herald, of Feb. 25, comments as follows on the first Canadian appearance of Mr. Hirwen Jones, the eminent English tenor who takes part in St. Patrick's concert at the New Grand on March 17: Mr. Hirwen Jones can rest assured of a warm reception whenever he appears in this city. His voice is one of the most phenomenal ranges, the ease with which he interprets the most difficult arias, and the clear enunciation so strikingly characteristic of the English artist, being evidenced alike in the upper and lower registers. Encores were accorded him on every appearance. For the rendering of Godard's "Jocelyn" Mr. Jones was honored with double recall. One feature that must have struck local musicians very forcibly was the fact that the majority of his numbers were entirely new, the Welsh melody variety in particular being a most novel variation upon the usual stereotyped repertoires.

INDEFINITE ADJOURNMENT.

Election Inquiry Will Not Proceed for Several Weeks.

The City Clerk Will Be Given an Opportunity to Set Himself Right—

Ballots Carelessly Handled in Printing Office.

The inquiry into the irregularities at the recent municipal election was taken up for a short time yesterday afternoon before Judge Edward Elliott. Only five witnesses were examined, and the hearing of their evidence only occupied three-quarters of an hour. An indefinite adjournment was then made, and it is probable the inquiry will not be resumed till the return of City Clerk Kingston from his two months' holiday in California.

William J. Stone, poll clerk in subdivision 9, ward 4, where Deputy Wm. Nutkins returned 197 votes, whereas there were only 181 names on the poll-book, was the first witness called. He testified that as far as he knew the name of every voter was entered on the pollbook. Witnesses saw nothing to lead him to think that any voter tried to put in more than one ballot for mayor.

Henry Pratt, deputy returning officer at No. 4 of ward 4, had received 300 ballots from the city clerk. The voters for mayor numbered 193, and 194 ballots were found in the box. Two of these Mr. Pratt rejected.

Mr. Elmer Smith, assistant in the office of City Clerk Kingston, was next called. He did not recollect seeing any ballots delivered on Saturday. Several packages from Talbot's were delivered on Friday morning, but witness did not notice any ballots delivered on Friday afternoon. The ballots were placed in the vault over night for safe keeping. Two packages on being opened were found to contain copies of council minutes, printed by Talbot. Witness had never lent his key to the city clerk's office, save once to the janitor, since the election.

Mr. C. W. Andrus, ex-assessor said he had never lent his key to the city clerk's office. He had been in the city clerk's office on the Saturday before the election, and had seen the ballot boxes there, but had not touched them.

Mr. Peter Toll, assessor, had not lent his key to the clerk's office to anyone, nor had he been in the office since November last, so that he knew nothing of the ballots.

This finished the evidence, and Mr. Meredith said he had no more witnesses to summon for the present. He suggested that, as little more could be done till the return of City Clerk Kingston, the inquiry be adjourned indefinitely. He pointed out that a week or two, at least, must elapse before the judge could bring in a report, as the stenographer's notes of the evidence had not yet been transcribed.

Judge Elliott expressed the same view as had Mr. Meredith, that City Clerk Kingston's further evidence would have to be taken. His worship said that so far as the evidence showed various parties could have had access to the ballots during the night when they

were left lying on the table in Talbot's printing office, and that undoubtedly the opportunity had been thus given for parties to have entered and possessed themselves of ballots. The ballots were in the custody of the printer until they were delivered to the city clerk, and upon him rested the responsibility for the careless manner in which they had been handled. The onus of proving that they had not been tampered with in the printing office rested upon the printer.

Mr. Meredith said he had tried to give the deputy returning officers and the city officials the fullest opportunity of clearing themselves in the investigation. They had given their evidence, he thought, in a satisfactory manner. The inquiry was then adjourned sine die.

ENTERTAINMENT BY SCHOOL CHILDREN

Very Pleasant Event in S. S. No. 22, London Township.

A very successful entertainment, consisting of recitations, dialogues and drills was given last Friday night, Feb. 28, in the school house of school section No. 22, London township, by the pupils of Mr. Duncan and Miss Hayes.

The school was very tastefully decorated with flags, bunting and evergreens, while drawings on the blackboards of landscape views contributed much to the general picturesqueness of the room. Mr. Sanders occupied the chair, and in a very pleasant speech introduced the programme, which consisted of two parts, the first, with the exception of an instrumental duet by Messrs. Cooke and Gillies, being given by the children.
