A lot of us got to talking one day about critics, and I said that some of my poems were just as good as other poets, but I could not sell them beause no one knew who I was."

Riley then told the story of writing the poem and of having it published n a Kokomo paper with a story to the effect that it had been found in an old book. The poem was copied and widely discussed. When proof was demanded a young man named Richards was emloyed to write it on the fly-leaf of an old dictionary. He wrote it with a quill pen and with diluted ink to make t look old, and it was almost a perect imitation of Poe's handwriting The old dictionary is now owned by Paul Lemperly, of Cleveland, Ohio. "When the truth came out," continued Mr. Riley, "I lost my position on the Anderson Democrat. No paper would even print my explanation of the affair. The memory of that time still stands out as one of the saddest experiences in my life, and one that I can never outlive. There is nothing for me
