PRINCIPAL CAVEN ON CHURCH UNION

Tells Welsh Presbyterian Council It is an Imperative Duty—Old Country News.

London, July 8.—Prof. Caven, replying to the congratulations of the English and Welsh Free Church Councils, said the alliance represented union of the Church of Christ; it embraced substantially the Presbyterianism of the world, and nearly all the branches of the reformed church in Europe. He believed the Christian church ought to regard union as an imperative duty. The time, he trusted, was not far distant in the future when it would be possible for them all to represent the principle of union, not only in an imperfect way by some federal constitution, but in a more practical, organic incorporation. Any system of national education should be kept entirely free from a sectarian bias, and there ought to be a conscientious clause to protect parties unable to have the full advantage of the established system.

Canada and India.
At the monthly luncheon of the Canadian Society today, Dr. Bayne, president, Mr. Duffin, agent-general for New Brunswick, made an interesting speech in favor of the development of Canadian trade with the West Indies, which he and several other speakers in Canada, especially Premier Murray, of Nova Scotia, expressed gratification at the increased interest taken by the British press and people in Canadian affairs, especially noticeable of recent years. He was much pleased at the speech of the Duke of Marlborough at the Dominion Day banquet.

Regarding the imperial preference question, he preserved an open mind; he had had a long conversation with Mr. Chamberlain, and was much impressed by his earnestness and sincerity, and thought his views were deserving of intelligent consideration. He was pleased to find the Canadians in London organizing for a social purpose.

Rev. Dr. Warden, of Toronto, spoke expressing his pleasure at finding Canada so prominent a center of the Empire. He noted that Premier Ross had come out in favor of Mr. Chamberlain's policy.

To Assist Farmers.
At the National Union conference at Southampton in the autumn, Sir Thomas Wright, M. P., will move that inasmuch as the agricultural proposals of Mr. Balfour will benefit the manufacturing classes, a large portion of the proceeds of the tariff levied on foreign manufactures should be devoted to the assistance of agriculture.

The Manchester Guardian hopes that Canada will forget the Dondolund incident in the joy of Scholtes' victory. The returns for the month of June show that Canada received 1,000 fish emigrants, against 9,995 last year. The number of foreigners received in Canada was 2,784, against 4,883 in 1903. The Globe, referring to Captain Mahan's speech, says it is through the navy that the first practical step towards federation must be taken, and special care is necessary to guard against the fatal dream of separate colonial navies, which was at one time prevalent in Australia, and now seems to obtain possession of the mind of Premier Laurier.

Sir Gilbert Parker asks what are the qualities which make King Edward successful as a diplomatist. He asks this in the July number of the "Smart Set," an English magazine, the way—and there also he answers it, as follows:
He has been called shrewd, but I prefer to think of him as a man of temperance and imagination, with an instinct as keen as that of a strategist, and with the impulses of the instinct rationalized by wide and high experience, and by the best of knowledge—that directly gained solo voice from the ablest men of the world.

INCREASE FOR PRINTERS
Substantial Advance for All Those Employed in Government Bureau.

Ottawa, Ont., July 8.—The increase in wages granted the employees of the Government printing bureau, in conformity to the recent increase granted the craft in Toronto, went into effect yesterday. The wages here are based on the scale in Toronto. The printers who got \$13.50 now get \$14.50; the compositors, from \$14.50 to \$15.50; the foremen from \$22 to \$25; and the assistant foremen from \$18.50 to \$21 a week. DAMS DESTROYED BY GOVERNMENT

Had Been So Placed as to Block Outlets of Temagami Lake.

Toronto, July 8.—There is some friction between the Ontario Department of Public Works and the Imperial Paper Mills Company, of Sturgeon Falls, concerning the building of a dam at the outlet of Temagami Lake, and Government Detective Rogers has just blown them up with dynamite.

Lake Temagami is on the highland, between Lake Nipissing, and Lake Huron, and has outlets into each of these waters. The outlets are very contracted, and by building small dams a large quantity of water can be stored. The southern outlet of the lake is through the Sturgeon River, on which is located the power house and mills of the Imperial Paper Company.

In December, 1902, the Ontario Government granted the company the right to build a dam at each of the outlets for the purpose of regulating the flow of water through the Sturgeon River. The location of the dam was to be determined by an engineer of the public works department, and the plans were to be approved by the commissioning of the dam. The dam at the southern outlet, however, was not completed.

Notwithstanding these protestations, the company has proceeded to construct at the northern outlet, thus completely closing the outlets of the lake. Complaints of the injurious effects of the dam have been received by the department, in view of the fact that the dam is under protest. Inspector Rogers, when he made the inspection, found that there were obstructions according to the plan, and by the use of dynamite removed them, together with two dams.

FAST LINE IDEA NOT ABANDONED

But Sir Richard Explains That It Would Cost a Million and a Half Per Year.

Ottawa, July 8.—The trade and commerce estimates were under consideration in the House of Commons yesterday. Sir Richard Cartwright, in reply to questions, explained the measure which has been taken for the improvement of the steamship service between Canada and the old country. Under the contract with the Allan Line, one of the vessels would go into commission in August this year and another next spring. The vessel would be a 10-knot boat, capable of covering the distance from Montreal to London in six days, about the time required for a transatlantic passage by the New York boats. The winter time would be about twelve hours more. Penalties would be imposed if the contractors failed to live up to their bargain. Last year fines were imposed, aggregating \$10,000.

In answer to A. C. Bell, of Picotou, the minister said he had given up the idea of ultimately securing a fast line across the Atlantic. It could not be secured, however, for less than a million or a million and a half dollars, and a subsidy from the Dominion treasury.

Mr. Bell, of Picotou, urged on the minister that this expenditure should not block the prosecution of the enterprise. The inauguration of a twenty-knot service from Canada to the United Kingdom would put this country on the front street of prosperity, and the Government would not hesitate to accept of framing a contract for a genuine fast service.

Mr. B. Wade, of Annapolis, urged that the most popular boats on the New York route were the vessels of moderate speed, like the Cedric. To his mind a service by the 10-knot turbine boats and steamers like the Bavarian and Tunisian were quite satisfactory to the traveling public. Not one of the ocean greyhounds from New York paid, Sir Richard Cartwright remarked that he had refused to bind the country to more than a two years' contract with the Allans, because it might be thought desirable before long to put the fastest type of passenger steamers on the Canadian route.

NO BREACH OF NEUTRALITY, EMBEZZLEMENT IS CHARGED

Premier Balfour On Protection of the Russian Seal Fisheries.

London, July 8.—In the House of Commons yesterday, Premier Balfour, replying to a question of Gibson Bowles (Conservative), said that the action of Great Britain in sending warships to the Komander Islands for the protection of seals was taken at the request of the Russians and Japanese. No jurisdiction would be exercised over Japanese vessels, but the Japanese Government had requested that any raid should be reported to it and the Government of Japan would deal therewith. There was no breach of neutrality in Great Britain's action, and no international question could arise therefrom. In the course of his answer, Premier Balfour said that the Komander Islands did not belong to Russia, as stated in his question, but to the United States.

GIGANTIC FRAUD CHARGED

Two Montreal Furriers Badly Wanted by the Police.

Montreal, July 8.—The places of business of Adolphus Franklin, proprietor of the Franklin Fur Company, and of Isaac Levy, proprietor of the Russian Fur Manufacturing Company, are in the hands of the authorities, seizure having been ordered by the police.

Detectives of Montreal and Toronto and a private agency are at work on the case, and High Constable Bissonnette held warrants for the arrest of the two men on charges of conspiracy to defraud and of obtaining money under false pretences.

Franklin and Levy first appeared as partners and did business in the name of the Russian Fur Company, but recently they dissolved partnership. Levy said that he had bought Franklin's share in the business, while Franklin claimed that he intended to carry the business on under a new name. He opened up the Franklin Fur Manufacturing, and it is understood that big purchases were made in Germany and the United States. By those with whom they did business, these two men were supposed to be bitter enemies of each other, but it is now believed that they were in league to defraud their creditors. A shipment of furs was sent to Toronto a short time ago, and a portion of it was pawned at Fleming & McManney's, on Adelaide street east. The police there were notified, but it is believed the notification came too late.

As soon as it became known that neither of the men was at his place of business, the creditors met and discovered that assets of \$500 were all that could be shown against aggregate liabilities of \$20,000.
