



Warns Sinners Against Eternal Punishment.

The doctrine of a real hell was proved by many explicitly Bibical texts. In Matthew reference was made to "everlasting fire prepared for the devil and his angels." Paul spoke of "everlasting destruction." Revelations contained several references to "the lake of fire," "the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone, which is the second death," etc. And against all these explicit references in God's Word were only the speculations of certain theologians. But no speculations of theologians had stood for more than eighteen years, while the death here today. words of Christ had withstood the test of over eighteen centuries.

GUELPH STRIKE OFF

President Lynch Orders Printers Back to Work.

Guelph, Jan. 16.—The printers' strike here has been settled. At noon President Lynch, of the International Union, telegraphed Toby James, provincial organizer, stating he had ordered the men to return to work last Saturday and that he would not do anything until the order had been complied with. Mr. James and the president of the local union interviewed the employers and asked them to allow the men to return to work. The employers consented to this and the men commenced work at 1 o'clock. President Lynch, in accordance with section 120 of the constitution, thus disavowed the strike.

JOHN MITCHELL'S PROBLEM

How To Be Friendly With Both Anthracite and Bituminous Operators.

Indianapolis, Jan. 16.-John Mitchell. president of the United Mine Workers of America, is in the tightest place of his career, figuring how to force and French military attaches at Port anthracite operators to terms by using soft coal contracts as a club and without abusing the long-standing friendship of bituminous operators.

Strategy would seem to require that contracts would not be concluded with bituminous operators in advance of an understanding being reached with the hard coal companies, as in the event of that being done soft coal would be poured into the eastern markets, should a hard coal strike follow the refusal of anthracite companies to recognize the Miners' Union, as demanded by the Shamokin convention of last month.

The miners demand a restoration of the wages paid previous to the reduction of 5.5 per cent which they accepted two years ag.
