# the Reunion of the Scattered Race.

London, April 13.-The cold procedure of an English court applied to the ques-tion of the fulfillment of the ancient prophecy that the Jews shall be restored to Zion, furnished last week one of the nost remarkable scenes in the history of urisprudence. It was made memorable chiefly by the impassioned plea, hours in ength, addressed to the bench by Israel Zangwill, who appeared without counsel o oppose the restriction of the operations of the Jewish colonial trust to Palestine. The case arose in this way: The efforts of the trust to acquire colonization rights in Palestine were made nugatory by the opposition of the Sultan of Turkey. Finding all operations in the Holy Land were mpossible, a project was initiated in 1903 for an extensive colonization in East

Africa. The Zionist Congress in 1905 opposed this and an amendment to the company's charter proposed the restricting of the field to Palestine and Asia. Only 18,400 out of the 130,000 shareholders voted, and 16,000 favored the restriction.

The minority, represented by Zangwill and others, applied to the court to refuse sanction of the restriction, on the ground that the vote was not representative of the great body of shareholders. In the marketplace of Friedrichshafen between three hundred and four hundred boys and girls, from 11 to 14 years of age, whose are in the outlying districts of the Tyrol and the Voraralberg, are contracted yearly for seven months, from April 1 to the end of October, to farmers from South Bavaria, Wurtemberg and Baden.

Little consideration is given to the wishes of the children, most of them being sent into service against their will, and in order to satisfy the avarice of their parents.

The children, generally in the charge on labor market day. Here they are drawn upon the marketplace and then brought forward for inspection by a crowd of farmers, who look them over, feel and poke their limbs, meanwhile discussing loudly their physical merits and demerits.

Gradually all are disposed of, and those in charge of the children then sign with the farmers agreements for the seven months' bondage, and the sums decided upon are handed over. 
