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TOP WEIGHT GOES
TO KING JAMESPlaudit Colt Will Carry 129 Pounds in
Saratoga Special.

New York, July 24.—Top weight in the \$5,000 Saratoga special, to be run on Aug. 2, the opening day at the Spa, has been allotted to King James, the Brooklyn handicap winner. The Plaudit colt will carry 129 pounds and makes allowances ranging from four to 43 pounds. James R. Keene's cell follows King James with 124, while Fitzherbert, the Suburban winner, comes third with 122 pounds.

Horsemen do not think Fitzherbert will start as they figure the weight is too much for him to carry miles and a quarter, the distance of the race. Malbie, winner of the Empire City handicap at Yonkers, is asked to carry 117 pounds, an increase of eleven pounds over what he carried when he won that event.

Thirty-one horses are entered in the special, and while it is known that all will not start, an interesting contest is expected.

DECLARED OFFHorses Taken Back to City of
the Straits for Blue
Ribbon Meeting.

MAYOR SHANK ON DECK

Trainer Says Cleveland Horse Is Fit
for M. and M.—Denver in Shape.

Detroit, July 23.—In view of the fact that the horses at Windsor have engagements at the Blue Ribbon meeting next week and the owners refused to race today, Secretary Hanrahan was forced to declare off the summer meeting. It had been intended to race off Thursday's card yesterday but the clouds of the morning with the possibility of the track being dry enough, Morning sunshine with the breeze that prevailed in the afternoon would have fixed things all right.

Horses started coming from Windsor on Thursday, and the rest of them crossed the river yesterday, so that last night found all of the grand circuit stables housed at the state fair grounds, excepting those of Lon McDonald, Jack McMahan, Scott McLean, John Dickerson and others who have put in the week as Springfield, Ill., and will be here today.

George M. Hendrie, president of the Windsor Association, is much disappointed with the turn things took, but it is likely that he will have an attractive card for next year with two or four stakes.

His Honor, the Mayor.
Bert O. Shank, mayor of North Randall, O., arrived yesterday with May training, the stable of Thistle Doune farm, owned by Gen. Wilson B. Chisholm, of Cleveland, and went back to his track last month.

This time Mr. Shank has but three horses, the star of the lot being Jack McKerron, that is apt to be favored by second place in the M. and M. Jack McKerron won a good colt trotter and took a two-year-old record of 2:23.4. He became lame behind and they let up on him for a couple of years, in which time he recovered.
