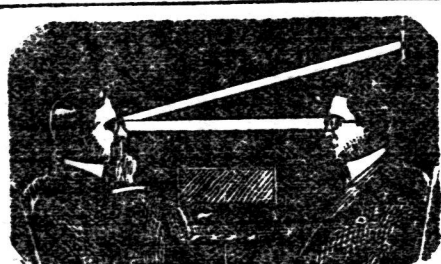

IMPROVE LABORATORY AND MAKE IT PAY

Victoria Hospital Trust Decide
to Do So—A Meeting on
Tuesday.

At the regular meeting of the hos-
pital trust held yesterday afternoon
it was decided to expend the sum of
\$125 on the pathological laboratory, in
order to place the department on a
paying basis.

"In conversation with Dr. Beal, our
pathologist, it was thought that the
department could be put on a pay-
ing basis, just the same as the X-ray
department is," said Chairman Judd.

Beal, an confident the department
will be as well managed as any other
in the hospital.

After some discussion, it was de-
cided to expend \$125 on the labora-
tory, under the direction of the house
committee.

Trustees S. Screeaton and George B.
Harris were named a committee to
make arrangements for connecting the
heating plant of the Victoria Hospital
with the Hygienic Institute. It was
thought that the boilers of the insti-
tute could be used as a reserve until
further arrangements were made.

The superintendent's report showed
that there were 181 patients admitted
during the month of June, 42 males,
66 females, and 53 children. During the
same period 170 were discharged, 40
males, 76 females, and 64 children.

There were 144 receiving treatment on
June 30. There were 53 operations, 15
births and 11 deaths. The receipts
were \$2,696.80.
