TWO GREAT DOGS IN BATTLE ROYAL

Ben Lewis' Landsdowne Ruler
and W. J. Clark's London V.
Pair of Great Setters.

LOCAL DOG TOP-NOTCHER

But the Other One Won For His
Beauty—Canine Exhibition Places
Everyone.

The dog show proved to be one of
the best features of the Fair, and
daily attracted large crowds. The
quality of the exhibits was much bet-
ter than usual, and the entry list was
much larger.

The show was particularly strong
in field dogs. In these classes, Ben
Lewis' Landsdowne, Pa. W. J. Clark,
London; A. E. Thoroughgood, Tor-
onto; Mrs. Chas. Waters, St. Thomas
had fine strings, and there was al-
ways a battle for the honors.

One of the closest fights was in the
English setter class, between Ben
Lewis' Landsdowne Ruler, a champion
at a score of shows, and W. J.
Clark's London V. The latter is a
wonderful field dog, and excelled in
this feature of the work. Ruler is a
typical bench dog, and after a long
deliberation was given the prize over
the London dog. Ruler's beautiful
face was what decided the award.

The original London, ancestor of Mr.
Clark's dog was the most famous dog
in America, and won every prize at
the big shows. He was owned by
Mr. J. W. Humpidge, of this city.

Landsdowne Lena, another of Ben
Lewis' string, won three firsts in the
bitch classes.

In the Pointer exhibit, E. B. Chase's
string, exhibited by Ben Lewis, won
a majority of the awards. In the
puppy class, Mrs. Waters' Yucupa, a
splendid specimen, won first. Her
good dog Oke was third to Lewis' pair.

Nice Name for a Bloodhound.
There was but one bloodhound, Dr.

was no competition they were given
all the awards.

everything in sight. All were ex-
ceptionally good animals.

The London Hunt Club showed
some fine English Foxhounds, Blin-
cher being a particularly good speci-
men. All the prizes went to the club.

In the American Foxhound class,
Tony Vita's Bosco proved to be a good
sort of dog and won without much
difficulty. R. Imrie's Queenie showed
up well.

Removed to Point Edward and Charge
Whole Cost of Work to the
Town.

Sarnia, Sept. 13.—Doctor McCul-
lough, chairman of the provincial
board of health, paid a visit to Sarnia
yesterday, and addressed a special
meeting of the town council and the
local board of health, concerning the
removal of the waterworks to Point
Edward.

The doctor stated that the plans and
specifications for the removal of the
plant must first be approved by the
provincial board of health.

The two most important features of
Dr. McCullough's address came as a
surprise to many.

He intimated that it was not abso-
lutely necessary for the council to
submit the bylaw to the people for ap-
proval, and furthermore should the by-
law be defeated at the polls, the pro-
vincial board of health possesses the
power to remove the waterworks to the
Point, and charge the cost thereof to
the corporation.

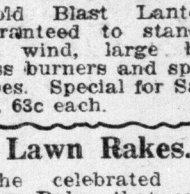
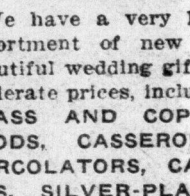
