

GERMANY'S ARROGANT WAY AROUSES U. S. GOVERNMENT

Berlin May Be Called to Account By Washington If War on Standard Oil Culminates in Violation of Treaty Rights.

Washington, Oct. 16. — If the German Government and the financial interests behind the movement to oust the Standard Oil Company from Germany think they can ruthlessly attack the American concern because it has been prosecuted as a trust, they are due to be rudely disillusioned. It was made very clear, and with considerable emphasis, at the state department today, that any attack on the Standard Oil Company by Germany will meet with a defence just as vigorous as the United States Government can put up.

Moreover, an official of the state department declared emphatically that in case this Government has to go to the aid of the Standard Oil, the "arrogant attitude" of the German Government and press of Germany toward American commercial interests in the last few months will be borne in mind. The state department has not failed to take note of the abuse and threats directed at the United States Government and American commercial interests recently by newspapers which are known to be semi-official. If the plan to oust the Standard Oil Company from Germany materializes, and the circumstances make it possible for this Government to act, there will be no hesitation about calling Germany to account.

A Serious Situation.

While Ambassador Lelshmann had reported to the state department the published facts about the plan to drive out the Standard Oil Company, it is not known exactly what the scheme will entail. It depends upon what steps are taken to carry out the intention as to whether the United States will have grounds to interfere. Until the German Government has adopted the plan, and its details are known, it will be impossible to decide whether any treaty right protecting American commercial interests in Germany has been violated. State department officials are now merely watching and waiting.

Information received here is to the effect that the German Government propose that the German Government shall create a Government monopoly in oil throughout the empire. This is to be done, it is said, through the taking over of all the oil interests now operating in Germany. If the Standard Oil objects to such treatment, the plan is to be carried out by force, and the property of the Standard Oil will be confiscated by the Government, the owners to receive whatever sum Government appraisers decide it is worth. There is no secret made of the fact that the real object is to drive out the Standard Oil Company.

BECKER SAID PUBLIC WOULD REWARD KILLING OF ROSENTHAL

Told Fellow-Prisoner That He Would Get Pension for Deed.

New York, Oct. 16. — "When this sensation blows over, the public will give me a pension for killing that crook Rosenthal."

These are the words attributed to Police Lieut. Charles Becker by James D. Hallen, his fellow-prisoner in the Tombs, at today's session of Becker's trial on the charge of instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, who "squealed" against him. Hallen was one of fifteen witnesses who testified today for the state. Assistant District Attorney Moss announced when adjournment was taken that he had only one or two more witnesses to call to complete the case for the people.

Two waiters from the Union Square Hotel told of frequent meetings between Becker and Rosenthal in the hotel dining-room when "they talked a long time."

One of the waiters said he saw Rosenthal pass the police lieutenant "a roll of bills."

Hallen testified that last August while he was an inmate of the Tombs prison, he heard a conversation between Becker and Detective White, formerly of the police lieutenant's strong-arm squad of gambling raiders. White had been locked up on a charge of "framing up" Jack Zeig.

The witness could not recall the exact date, but from a memorandum, to which he referred, he thought the conversation occurred on a Friday.

Becker's boast, "White said, the witness testified, "Chief, I have been looking for you. I have it straight that they have arrested Louie, and that he has given the whole thing up." Becker stepped out of the bathroom.

Becker said: "That's only one more crook. They have only crooks to tes-

tify against us. What of that? No jury on earth will believe them."

"Becker said: 'Sit fast, Jimmy; after this is blown over they will be giving us pensions for killing this gambler, Rosenthal.'"

Hallen corrected his testimony to say Becker exclaimed that "the public would give him (Becker) a pension for killing that crook, Rosenthal."

KEIR HARDIE TELLS OF BRITISH PROBLEMS

Discusses Political Problems at Opening of Guelph Canadian Club.

Guelph, Oct. 17.—Keir Hardie, the British Labor leader, opened the first meeting of the Canadian Club last night with an address on "The Political Situation in the Old Land."

Replying to a question from a member, following his prediction that if on the next dissolution the Conservatives gained the day, the two parties would have to unite to form a Government, Mr. Hardie said that the policy of the Labor party of Great Britain is to force the other two parties into a coalition, and then fight on an open field the battle of property-owners vs. the workmen, of capital vs. labor.

Asked regarding the stand of the Labor party on prohibition, his reply was that they did not believe prohibition would solve labor problems, for in the most temperate countries, had the poorest people in the world.

He denounced Sir Edward Grey's foreign policy as one which embroiled Britain in all European controversies, and which led to the Russo-British partition of Persia, and a railway through that country to India.

Miss Wylie, the British suffragette, who is touring Canada, is to address a meeting here next Wednesday on "Votes for Women."

Vancouver, Oct. 17.—Richard Tognby, chauffeur, was last Thursday night driving on the wrong side of Fourth avenue west when he ran down and killed David Gray, who was waiting for a street car. The next day in the police court Tognby was charged with manslaughter, but was acquitted. Today the attorney-general ordered an indictment prepared against Tognby, who will be re-arrested and be charged at the assizes.

BURIED AT WINDSOR

John Davis Had Been Mayor of the City Five Times.

FATHER VAUGHAN ON WEST

Says It's Excellent Place for Man Who's Willing to Work.

Then, instead of being all in, down and out, you'll come out on top and become a useful member of an enterprising community, and not at all a bad advertisement for the old country.'"

MORE CHINESE TURMOIL

Amoy, China, Oct. 17.—Strong anti-Christian feeling is reported to be developing in the Kien district of Southwestern Fu Kien. Many disturbances have occurred, and the Government forces have been defeated in their attempts to restore order.

BAPTIST CONVENTION OPENS AT BRANTFORD

Striking Address Delivered By the President on Conditions in Quebec.

Brantford, Oct. 17.—Nearly four hundred delegates of the Baptist Churches of Ontario and Quebec assembled in this city last night for the annual convention.

Rev. Dr. A. L. Therrien, of Grand Ligne, the president, delivered a striking address at the opening session in Park Baptist Church, and Rev. C. W. Rose welcomed the delegates to the city.

Reference was made by Dr. Therrien to Canada's present condition of peace as compared with a century ago. Issues affecting the progress of the Baptist Church had also been settled, the progress of the other races of Canada and the endowment of McMaster University having been disposed of harmoniously. Touching on the future of the Grand Ligne mission, Dr. Therrien said that if the mission was merged into one convention it was felt that the other conventions might be alienated, and one convention would not be able to bear the burden of French evangelizing.

Proclaiming a message of liberty, the president declared that Baptists as Protestants claimed the right to be played on an equal footing with fellow-citizens of other races and creeds. There was no national church in Canada, and Baptists protested against any law or interpretation of law which gave to any church special privileges as the privilege of the majority in a democracy. He urged a uniform law.

Dr. Therrien said that the efforts to place the French language on a par with English throughout the Dominion were to be deprecated. One language and one system of education should prevail.

In concluding his address the president paid a striking tribute to the Government in Quebec and declared that the people of that province were awakening from their Rip Van Winkle slumbers, and the clouds of ignorance and superstition were passing away. The French people were becoming endowed with progressive ideas, and already Quebec stood ahead of other Canadian reform work.

CLAIMED \$100

Interesting Horse Deal Was Settled After Jury Disagreed.

Regina, Oct. 16.—A horse case of unusual interest was tried at the sitting of the division court here, in which Mr. Frank Falden, of Falden's Corner, was the defendant, and Mr. H. W. Falden, of Regina, was the plaintiff. The suit was for breach of warranty, the plaintiff claiming \$100, because, as he stated, the horse was not as sound as he was represented to be.

The defendant, however, claimed that he had represented the horse as having worked well for him, and though spirited, had behaved well, not having as the plaintiff alleged, it had gone since became his property. Evidence was also given that Falden did not have knowledge as to the horse being a kicker. The jury disagreed, and the case was set for a second day.

CHILDREN'S HOME

Was Opened at Chatham by Lieutenant-Governor Gibson.

The guest of honor was entertained at the home by Boy Scouts. At the ceremony speeches were delivered by Dr. W. R. Hall, Dr. R. V. Bray, Dr. S. Patterson, Rev. Roy Van der, Mayor Anderson, Dr. T. R. Holmes, and J. J. Kelso, of Toronto; Joseph Sanders, of London, and Mr. Hadley, of Woodstock. The home has been well furnished, and will assist greatly in the work of the Children's Aid Society in Kent.

THE CATTLE EMBARGO

British Government Asked to Permit Free Entry of Store Cattle.

London, Oct. 16.—The Canadian Cattle Importation Association is exerting every effort to bring pressure upon members of the Government with a view to the removal of what is deemed to be an unjust embargo upon Canadian store cattle to British ports. The various chambers of commerce throughout the country are being invited to appoint two of their most influential members to become delegates on a strong deputation which will go to the House of Commons at the earliest possible moment. Some currency has been given to a report that the Dominion needs all her present supplies for her own use, and exportation is out of the question. It is therefore felt that a pronouncement upon the subject would be of material assistance.

Around the Table

In laying the table for a company dinner twelve inches of space is allowed for every guest, or more if you can spare it, measuring from the center of one plate to the center of the next. First place the chosen ten-inch dinner plates exactly in the middle of the space allotted to each person and the proper distance apart; this is called the service plate and should occupy this space from the beginning of the service until exchanged for a warm plate when the first hot course is served after the soup, which is the fish course.

It is considered bad form not to have a plate in front of each guest until dessert, but before the serving of this course (the dessert) the space is bare and the crumbs are removed with a crumb knife and tray and this is the proper time and place to brush the crumbs.

Place at the right as many knives as will be required before the dessert, which are two, one large dinner knife with a steel blade, and a smaller knife for fish, (the latter not much used today, as all fish served at dinner is served either boiled or baked, and in each case they are needed to separate it with the sharp edges turned toward the service plate, and at the right of the knives place the soup spoon with the inside of the bowl turned up, then oyster fork or small fork for oysters.

At the left place as many forks as will be needed before the dessert, unless you are to have many courses, when two small silver forks of display.

Place the forks in the order in which they are to be used, the fish fork at the left, then the oyster fork, and then the large dinner fork for the roast, all with the tines turned up, the dinner fork lying close to the plate.

After the fork is served with or without the meat course, the choice spoons, which our hostess may have, and is sometimes tempted to place on the table from the beginning, show better taste if placed on the plates at the right of the sherbet glass.

All silver is placed one inch from the edge of the table. On the extreme left is placed a large dinner fork of the same elegant quality as the dinner cloth, laminated beautifully and folded four times, then folded diagonally, and a piece of linen broad or roll placed in it, but in a straight line.

Bread and butter are not served with the course dinner, the purpose of this roll or piece of bread is to be broken into bits to aid in getting a refractory morsel of food on the fork that could not be placed there without it.

Making Saleswomen

Should advanced training become general the effect upon saleswomen would be a dual one—personal and economic. Good salesmanship is a composition of more science and a great deal of art. The science can be taught in the form of certain rules and principles—the art can be developed through experience, wisely supervised and interpreted.

Industrial instruction will unequivocally have a beneficial effect upon the economic status of the women. With increased efficiency and a higher standard of help the merchant will undeniably be the gainer. The immense time saved will represent to him a material profit, and the additional advertising in conducting a superior store will be an important asset.

FACTS ABOUT TYPHOID FEVER

[By a Physician.]

Typhoid fever is due to the typhoid bacillus. The only animal that has it, Man is the only animal that has it. The bacilli find their way into the human body exclusively through the mouth. Milk and water are two of the chief typhoid carriers.

Air or wound infections do not have to be considered. Therefore food—and particularly raw foods—should be carefully guarded.

Typhoid may last from four to six weeks and much longer if there are complications. Those usually met with are:

Secondary infections, particularly pneumonia, inflammation of veins, inflammation of glands, perforations and secondary peritonitis and hemorrhages.

A tired feeling and some aching are usually the first symptoms which appear after the bacilli have been in the intestines at least ten days.

Constipation and fever follow, and when the temperature is taken it will probably be over 100.

It generally takes a week from the time the fever starts to be fairly certain of the diagnosis.

A person having typhoid fever should get the best medical and nursing service he can get, and should be kept in bed. Equality is necessary when one has typhoid fever. There should be no worrying and no fretting. The attitude should be one of accepting and trusting, and if you have secured the best of aid it will be comparatively easy to follow this course.

The old-fashioned, long-drawn-out typhoid has practically been eliminated through precaution and care. The next step is to prevent the disease by removing the causes.

Then what is the man to do who has not had the disease and proposes to keep clear of it?

In ordinary times be careful of the water.

Do not drink any raw milk unless you are sure the source is safe. Do not let others peel fruits and vegetables to be eaten raw if you can do it yourself. If you cannot prepare them yourself and are not sure how the work is done or by whom, eat the cooked vegetables and fruit.

Cook oysters and clams unless certain about food. Do not eat food where flies abound. Wash your own hands before eating. Insist that others should have clean hands when preparing the food.

If a cook is employed see that he or she has not had typhoid recently (within the last six months), or has not been in places where there was typhoid.
