IRELAND TO BE AS A COLONY

London, Jan. 9.—During the consideration of the Irish home rule bill in the House of Commons today, Felix Cassel moved an amendment to omit clause twenty-eight, which states that the judicial committee of the privy council shall hereafter be the appellate court of Ireland, as in the case of the dominions. Mr. Cassel denounced the provision as being openly and avowedly separatist, placing Ireland in the same position as a colony. Irish appeals, he said, should continue to go to the House of Lords.

Sir Rufus Isaacs, the attorney-general, opposed the amendment, which was eventually defeated by a majority of 127.

Augustine Birrell, the chief secretary for Ireland, moved to amend clause thirty-one by adding a declaration that the continuance in office of the lord-lieutenant should not be affected by any change in the ministry.

R. M. Neill proposed to add a provision that the lord-lieutenant should conform to the practice of the governors of the overseas dominions in relation to matters of political controversy. This proposal was rejected by a majority of 112, and Birrell's amendment was then agreed to.

Ten clauses were disposed of by the operation of closure.
