There were in the neighborhood of 400 guests in attendance, many of them from out of town, and the affair was one of the triumphs of the present social sea-

Some Novel Decorations. A novel idea was used in the decoration scheme which drew forth appreciative comments from many guests. The large stage was "set" with mountain scenery, including a real waterfall, a hermit's cave with the familiar pot nearly at the boiling point, and thurs, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Ashplant, all the earmarks of the conditions existing in the days of Capt. Kidd and other well-known gentlemen of adventure. Fourteen members of Corteses' orchestra disguised in regulation hermit costume, filled in the spaces between the rocks in a truly picturesque style, and there was wafted up a program of music that has seldom been equalled in London. The melody menu was varied and delightful, comprising an abundance of beautiful selections by popular and classical composers.

Wore Club Colors. The club colors, red and black, were used to advantage in different parts of the ballroom, and the members of the club added an extra dash of color to across their shirt-fronts.

Across the front of the platform was a huge banner in club colors bearing the words' "The Hermitage, 1914," while suspended over the rustic scene on the stage was an illuminated intimation, "The Hermitage Year 1100."
