Six Adults and Five Children, I nmates of St. Elizabeth Hospital, Are Dead Through Destruction of Institution Last Night-Many of Fire-Tr apped Obliged To Leap From Third Story To Pavemen t.

Farnham, Que., Oct. 26.—Six adults and five children at least lost their lives a fire which destroyed St. Elizabeth Hospital last night. This morning the ruins were still blazing, and it was impossible to approach near them to make search for missing patients, variously estimated at from fifteen to twenty-five. The hospital is managed by Grey Nuns, and comprised two buildings, one devoted to accommodate sick, and another a school for children. About 300 people were in the two buildings when the fire broke out.
