Tells Same Experience.

Richmond street, informed The Ad-Richmond street, informed The Advertiser that he also proposed to close his place of business commencing on Sunday next, or whatever date is set aside by the druggists as a whole. Mr. Taylor states a case similar in prac-tically every detail as related by the

He states that it is of no benefit to them and certain-ly will not pay if they are fined for every little five-cent purchase that a omer might make in conjunction with the purchase of a medical neces-sity. "I was fined for selling a fiveent chocolate bar," he elucidated.

Annoyed by Spotters.

Mr. Taylor explains that during the short period the store is open on Sun-day, the staff is continually pestered by plainclothes persons presumably from the police headquarters, endeavorng to make small purchases of candy or cough-drops, hoping to make an arrest. In company with the other lruggists, Mr. Taylor realizes that the closing of the stores would mean a great inconvenience and possible hardship to many citizens.


