This they refused do, and I practically had to crawl to the switchboard on the ground floor of the building to call a taxi for myself," said Poulson. "My spine was wrenched out of place as of my visit, and my own doctor had to give me treatments to have it reset." This is Poulson's story of his harsh treatment at the nands of the medical men of the D.

The condition of nervous hysteria, which he wrought himself into upon finding out that he could receive no aid from this institution, caused him to flounder on the floor, and, as a result of his own excitement, he probably gave himself several bruises. He is a man that is to be pitied, but his condition was
