POULTRY FOOD, NOT A LUXURY

Lower Prices Should Promote
General Use From Economic Standpoint.

(Experimental Farms Note.)
Poultry meat has dropped in price to such an extent that its general use should be more seriously considered. Viewed from the economic as well as the scientific standpoint of nutrition, it is worthy of a higher place and more frequent use in the daily diet than it has been accorded. It should be regarded as an essential part of our diet rather than as a luxury.

The question of the value of poultry meat for food has been given attention by chemists at various times. Results of their researches have been published from time to time. Analyses have been made of the flesh of practically all kinds of domestic fowl, and these furnish a basis for comparison of poultry meat with other articles of human food. A comparison of poultry meat with beef, veal, lamb and pork shows that the refuse in poultry is somewhat less than in the other meats. Furthermore, the carcasses of fowl can be used as soup stock, thus rendering available a large amount of nourishment which would otherwise be lost, and which in the case of other meats is often discarded. The amount of water is about the same in poultry as in other meats, but the amount of indigestible nutrients in poultry is small. Summing up these differences poultry shows a slightly higher protein content, a higher fat content, and a higher percentage of available nourishment than other meats. As fats furnish more heat per unit weight than proteins or carbohydrates, and since poultry meat is somewhat lower in fat than other meats, its fuel value is correspondingly less. To state this in another way, poultry meat furnishes more tissue forming, but less of the heat forming, elements, and it must be borne in mind that as a rule the former are the more expensive.

Common or domestic fowl contains more refuse than average poultry, is about average in protein but richer in fat. Turkey contains a relatively little refuse, about 2 per cent more protein, and the same proportion of fat. Goose shows the lowest percentage of refuse of the poultry meats, a higher proportion of protein and much higher fat content. Combined with this is a certain preference against goose which has a tendency to lower the market price. This has resulted to make goose one of the cheapest, most wholesome and nutritious foods on the market. Duck contains relatively large amounts of refuse, little protein and large quantities of fat.

Poultry as a whole (especially chickens and geese), with the low price and high muscle forming properties, the easily digested and palatable qualities makes the poultry food for everybody, particularly for those in offices and for invalids and children.—F. FINISH THE BIRDS BEFORE MARKETING
At Present Prices Thin Poultry Will Not Pay Cost of Handling.

(Experimental Farms Note.)
At no time does it pay to market poultry in an unclean condition, and this year, when the prices offered are unusually low, this applies more than ever.

With the low prices thin birds will not bring enough to pay for the trouble of handling, say nothing of the cost of feed. In some cases there will be no sale for them at all. The only kind for which there will be a demand this fall, so if it is only for the sake of the birds, it is well to finish them before marketing.

Even if there was a ready market for all kinds of birds, as has been the case for several years, a fat bird is a better bird than a thin bird. It is just this way: If anything dreadful has happened to a bird, it is better to let it die than to let it be marketed. Experiments on crate fattening conducted by the Poultry Division, Experimental Farm, Ottawa, furnish the following data: Sixty cockerels were put into feeding crates and fed for three weeks. These birds were weighed when they were first put into the crates and when they were taken out. The average gain per bird in the three weeks was 1.5 pounds.

These figures show that it pays to crate feed. A feed cost of 87c. per pound of live weight, and the marketing increased the value of the whole lot from a 15c per pound quality to a 25c per pound quality.

Halifax.—Wholesalers have found slight revival of trade simultaneous with Christmas buying. Accounts payable have been very slow. Retailers report Christmas business about 75 per cent in volume, compared with 1921.

St. John.—Wholesale trade is just normal. Retail trade for Christmas is better business than last year. Collections only fair.

Montreal.—Wholesale trade reports fair volume of business without noting any particular change in general conditions. Retail business embracing Christmas rush is satisfactory. No improvement in collections.

Toronto.—Wholesale trade reports very little change in general conditions. Manufacturers of wooden goods are fairly busy. Steel plants getting busy. Christmas rush is satisfactory. No improvement in collections.

Winnipeg.—Wholesale trade fair. Some lines report increased business. Retail business for Christmas week of very fair volume. Collections satisfactory.

Calgary.—The trade conditions in general are satisfactory. Some lines showing increase over last year. Collections satisfactory.

Saskatoon.—Wholesale reports very little change in conditions. Collections satisfactory.

Edmonton.—The trade conditions in general are satisfactory. Some lines showing increase over last year. Collections satisfactory.
