

TRAVELS 3,000 MILES TO SEE MOTHER AGAIN

Los Angeles Motorist Passes
Through Sarnia En Route
To New Brunswick.

Sarnia, July 9.—This morning there
drove ashore from the ferry Louis
Phillips H. Walker and family of Los

Angeles, who are motoring to visit
Mr. Walker's mother in St. John,
N. B. They had traveled over 3,000
miles by the time they reached
Sarnia.

Hikers of a different nature stepped
from the next ferry when Richard G.
Schmidt, 16, and Kathleen Kerr, 17,
came ashore with their wheels. They
carried letters from their parents in
Chicago to show that they were
bound for Goderich. They had traveled
by bicycles from Holland, Mich.,
a distance of 225 miles, and were
tranquilly facing the prospect of another
100-mile run to Lucknow.

ABANDONED BABE IS FOUND ON LOT IN ROYAL CITY

New-Born Baby Girl Is Re-
moved To Hospital and
Mother Follows.

CHILD MAY RECOVER

Guelph, July 9.—Hearing sounds
coming from a vacant lot near his
home, which appeared to be very
much like the cries of a young child,
Norman Dingman, who resides on
Hood street, decided to investigate
the noise, and as he walked in the
direction in which the sound appeared
to be from, he could catch the
cries quite distinctly before he had
gone many yards from his residence.
Unable to determine just where the
cries originated, Mr. Dingman walked
some distance before his attention

was finally drawn to an object under
a tree, covered by a black cloth, and
upon lifting the cover he was startled
to find the form of a new-born
babe lying on the ground. The au-
thorities were notified of the dis-
covery and a physician sent for,
while the infant was carried to Mr.
Dingman's house to be cared by
women in the neighborhood, pending
the arrival of a doctor.

The child, which was later removed
to the General Hospital, was a little
baby girl, and as she evidently did
not suffer any ill-effects from the
brief period of exposure, hopes are
entertained for her recovery, accord-
ing to a report from the hospital to-
night.

Learning that the child had been
born but a short time, Detective
Greenaway and Constable Reeve of
the local police force set out in search
of the mother, who was located at a
residence on Hooper street, from
where she was also removed to the
hospital. She did not make any state-
ment to the officer, but according to
information secured by the police, the
child was left in the field only a few
minutes before it was found.

The authorities were not prepared
to state today whether or not action
would be taken against the mother
for abandoning the babe, but there
may be some developments within
the next few days.

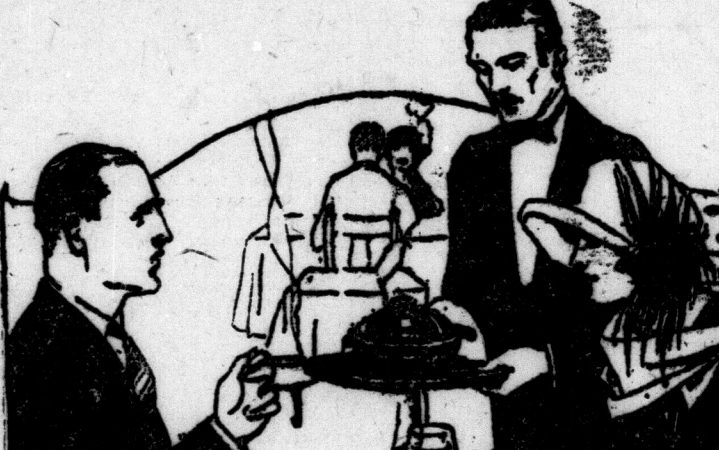
