MURDERED BY HER MOTHER.

The Child of a British Nobleman said to have been Killed by the Most Atrocious Treatment-

BELFAST, Feb. 18 .- Further details in regard to the death of little Mary Helen Montague, the three-year-old daughter of Mrs. A. Montague, wife of Lord Robert chester, show the case against the mother to be very black. Mrs. Montague was committe for trial yesterday at Londonderry, on the charge of causing the death of her daughter by locking her up in a dark room, after fastening her hand behind her back, and securing the string in tying the child to a ring in the wall. It was added that the child was stripped naked before being strung up in the manner indicated. It is said that the poor little girl, on the day she was subjected to this treatment, had been kept without food since breakfast, and that she was ocked up in the dark room at seven o'clock locked up in the dark room at seven o'clock in the evening by the governess. At two o'clock, it is added, the child was visited by the mother, who fastened its arms in the way described, in spite of the little girl's heart-rending cries. Nobedy appears to have given a thought to the child until 5 o'clock the same evening, when, according to the mother's testimony, she unlocked the door of her daughter's prison and found her insensible.
