WOUND UP IN A HURRY.

MR. JUSTICE ROSE SUMMARILY ACQUITS DICKS.

The Crown fails to prove that the burning of Mrs. Dicks was by design on the part of accused and hence the case from the jury—The Prisoner Not Released.

Mr. Justice Rose brought the Dicks murder trial to a termination yesterday afternoon by taking the case from the jury and directing the acquittal of the prisoner. Dicks was not immediately discharged, but at the request of the Crown was held over till this morning, when he probably will be given his liberty.

The Crown's case depended upon two leading theories. One of them was that the house was fired for the sake of the insurance, and the other was that the death of Mrs. Dicks was incidental to the burning of the building. The other was that Mrs. Dicks was killed for the insurance on her life, and that the burning of the building was for the purpose of covering up the killing. The former theory failed because the evidence showed that no insurance could be received on the property in the house at the time of the fire. The other theory was knocked out by the evidence of Dr. Caven, which was to the effect that Mrs. Dicks was killed when the fire attacked her body.

Neighbor Tracy continues. When the court resumed yesterday morning the examination of John Tracy was proceeded with. Tracy swore that Dicks and his wife appeared to be an affectionate couple. On the night of the fire the prisoner was going about only partially clad, and lamenting grievously the fate of his wife. Witness testified to finding a lamp and some pieces of broken lamp glass on the stairs of the building.

To Mr. Johnston witness described the condition of the furnace pipes as he saw them after the fire. He said that the pipes were in such a position that the parts burned could be reached by the fire. There were no marks of escape by way of the stairs. Richard Scholtes, John F. Taylor and James Brennan, firemen, described the fire. The front of the building was pretty well gone when the firemen reached it. Scholtes said that Dicks looked like a man who had got out of bed in a hurry.

Medical Testimony. Dr. Caven, who made the post mortem examination of the body of Mrs. Dicks, described what he had found. The body was covered with cinders and ice. Hanging on the face were remnants of a cotton vest, a chemise and a blue serge waist. There were lumps of charred muscle hanging about, and the bones of the arms were bare; the only portion of flesh untouched by fire was a heart-shaped area on the bosom; the backbone stood out bare and the ribs were burned in places. The face was black and charred. There were no marks of violence on the body, but the fire could have obliterated any of some of them; evidently the body was on its face when burned.

A legal dispute arose over the admission of the evidence to the time of the last meal partaken of by Mrs. Dicks and his Lordship finally decided not to accept the evidence, in view of the importance of the case, promising at the same time to reserve a case for the defence, if necessary.

Dr. C. R. Dickson, who had treated Mrs. Dicks for some time, described her health as generally fair, though the operations for gonorrhea resulted in a considerable drain on her system. When the court resumed in the afternoon Mr. Oser proceeded to give further evidence as to the health of Mrs. Dicks.

The Dead Woman's Relations. Elizabeth Hance, mother of the deceased Mary Dicks, swore that her daughter was about 30 years of age at the time of her death. She had been married 13 years. The actual condition of her health was good. Witness had seen her daughter about six months before her death, and she appeared to be in good health. Witness swore that her daughter and Dicks did not live together.

In her cross-examination Mrs. Hance stated that she had lived in several different places in Toronto in three years, all in the vicinity of Brant, Victoria and Front streets. She saw her daughter about once a month from February to October of last year; but she had never seen her since. She said that her daughter was under the care of a physician during that time.

Agnes Hance, sister of deceased, as a witness for the defence, swore that Dicks before her death she did not look very well, but claimed to be in good health, and that she saw her sister had undergone an operation, but was not aware that she was receiving medical treatment more or less constantly during 1894.

Appointed School Inspector. Cobourg, Dec. 12.—Mr. A. Odell, teacher in the Collegiate Institute here, was this morning appointed Inspector of Schools for Northumberland County.

Was there any evidence of any other violence? No, the fire was a sufficient explanation of the cause of death. By Mr. Oser: Having regard to all the indications are they sufficient to enable you to form a positive opinion that there was no application of fire to the body prior to death? I think so.

Then in your opinion, the condition of the body was inconsistent with the theory of death being produced first and the body placed in the position it was in and fire applied to it afterwards? I think so. I think death was due to fire.

And you think it would be impossible to maintain the theory that death was first produced and the premises afterwards set on fire to conceal the guilt? I think so.

What are your reasons for this conclusion? I depend chiefly upon the condition of the mouth and throat and the finding of a frothy fluid in the lungs, indicating the condition of things from the tongue back to the lungs, what else could have produced it? What did those conditions indicate? They indicated suffocation and irritation.

In view of this evidence His Lordship asked Mr. Oser what he proposed to do. His Lordship dismisses the charge. Mr. Oser, in reply, admitted that the evidence excluded the possibility of a case being established of a purposeful fire to conceal the crime of murder. He proceeded to say that the evidence which the Crown had yet to offer was the evidence which had reference to the \$10,000 of insurance on the life of Mrs. Dicks and the evidence of previous fires with which the prisoner was associated.

His Lordship, on taking the case from the jury, said it was not the object of the Crown to convict any man of crime. The object of the Crown was to bring out the facts, and if these facts pointed to guilt, it was the duty of the jury to find it. The present case afforded a good illustration of how criminal justice should be administered. It was necessary that the investigation should take place in the most thorough manner possible.

The Accused Still in Custody. There was another charge against the prisoner, that of arson, in connection with the burning of the house. That will not now be pressed. Owing to the prisoner's previous associations with fire and insurance matters, however, the Crown did not feel justified in agreeing to his immediate discharge, and asked that he be remanded till this morning, so that the officers may have time to consider the matter further.
