



嵌 In submitting the report of the On-tario Stallion Enrolment Board for the year ending July 31st, 1923, the chairman, Robert McEwen, and sec-retary, R. W. Wade, call atention to the fact that more than 15 per cent. of the 1,317 stallions enrolled are A1 and over 73 per cent are Form I horses, leaving only 10 per cent. in the defective class and one per cent. undesirable. This indicates that Ontario occupies a fairly strong position

as regards the quality of the stallions used. A summary of breeds of stallions enrolled for the years 1912 to 1923, inclusive, shows Clydesdale leading in numbers all through the period, with Percherons second and Standard-bred third.

IN CASE OF AN ACCIDENT

Section 18 of the Motor Vehicles' Act reads: "If an accident occurs to any person on foot or horseback, or in a vehicle, or to any horse or vehicle in charge of any person owing to the presence of a motor vehicle on

a highway, the person in charge of such motor vehicle shall return to the scene of the accident and render all possible assistance and give in writing to any one susutaining loss or injury, his name and address, and also the name and address of the owner of such motor vehicle and the number of the permit."
