The New York Herald estimates that the retaliatory tariff measure recently enforced against American commerce by the various European powers means a loss of \$200,000,000 a year to American farmers, manufacturers, and labor.

The following figures are given by a contemporary representing the trade of Newfoundland: Some of the imports are as follows: Beef, \$20,000; Butter, \$10,000; Flour, \$15,000; Pork, \$12,000; Tallow, \$8,000; Fish, \$25,000.

Upper province papers of both sides of politics are strongly advocating the idea of taking Newfoundland into the dominion in order that we might be able to secure all of this trade instead of only a part at present.

It is said too that apples so packed have realized better prices than those shipped in barrels, buyers who have tried them being now anxiously acquiring for more.

It is beginning to look as if we might expect a dissolution of parliament and a general election right off. If the present session summons parliament to assemble for the despatch of business is not issued within the next two weeks, or thereabouts, it can be taken for granted that there is to be a general election before the end of the year.
