OBITUARY

At Rosindale, Mass., on the 25th of August, 1922, their passed away, Mr. Warren Marshall, aged 74 years. Mr. Marshall was born in Hillsboro, N. B., but when quite a boy he came to Nova Scotia, when he learned the blacksmith trade with James Carleton, one of the most efficient tradesmen of his time. FRUIT TRADE COMMISSIONER TO VISIT VALLEY THIS MONTH
