and children who have been deserted by faithless husbands, a class which is increasing so alarmingly that steps should be taken at once to do something to remedy the evil.

Many interesting cases might be mentioned of those, who having sought shelter in their time of need, and having received impressions for good there, have turned from their evil ways. But space will not admit of a full statement of them. Three keepers of dens of iniquity who sought shelter in the Home to evade the police, have given up the old life and are struggling to earn an honest livelihood.

A poor orphan girl with no friends or home, said with her latest breath:—"Were it not for this Home I would have been eternally lost. Kiss me again; no one has kissed me since my mother died."

Another, an English emigrant who had graduated in the school of crime at the early age of twelve, testified in a prayer meeting in one of the churches recently, that she had been picked up out of the gutter in a helpless state of intoxication, and brought to the police court on more than one occasion, but that she had been converted in the
