

►APTAIN HILL was born i. Economy, Colchester County, in 1854. He went to sea when 15 years of age and continued for eight years in Nova Scotia sailing ships. He passed for First Officer's certificate in 1872, and obtained a Master's certificate in London in 1874. His first appointment on a steamer was as Fourth Officer of the cable ship "Hooper," in 1870; in 1872 he was appointed Third Officer of the steamship "Surrey," a 4,000-ton steamer sailing between London and the East Indies. He was promoted to Second Officer in 1873, First Officer in 1874, and a year later, at the age of twenty-one, to the command of this same steamer, which he continued to command until 1878, when he resigned on account of ill health.

It was always Captain Hill's ambition and desire to command a steamer sailing out of his native country, and he applied and received the appointment of Commander of S. S. "Ulunda," sailing between Halifax and London. During this command he made the acquaintance of Mr. Harry Chipman, and the outcome of this acquaintance was the formation of the Canada Atlantic line and the building of the steamship 'Halifax." The ship was built under Captain Hill's superintendence, and has been commanded by him ever since.

Captain Hill is recognized as a skilful navigator, and is one of the youngest and best known commanders sailing out of Halifax. His genial manners have
