

TRACKED OVER THE WORLD. A San Francisco despatch of Saturday gives the following account of how a bank

robber and murderer was hunted over the world and caught on the Pacific Coast: "The reported arrest of Burges is not fully credited in police circles here. New York, October 25.—The annual convention of the Fenian Brotherhood in secret session adjourned yesterday. The result is almost the complete reorganization of the Fenian Brotherhood in this country. The office of Head Centre in this country is abolished, and that of the General Secretary created. The action of the convention created considerable excitement as it is generally regarded as a virtual discarding of General Bourke, O'Donovan Rossa, and the remaining prominent persons who have had charge of the Skirmishing Fund. The change is supposed to be the work of James Stephens, ex-chief of the Brotherhood, now in Paris, who it is claimed will shortly arrive here to assume charge of the affairs of the Brotherhood.
