**EXTERNAL AFFAIRS****ESTABLISHMENT OF GOVERNMENT OFFICE  
IN FRANCE BY QUEBEC**

On the orders of the day:

**Mr. R. N. Thompson (Red Deer):** Mr. Speaker, I should like to direct my question to the Prime Minister. It relates to the fact that several weeks ago the Secretary of State for External Affairs stated that the government was examining the announcement made by the French minister of information with regard to the establishment of an intergovernmental department between the province of Quebec and the government of France. In view of the fact that one Maurice Jacquinot has been appointed by the Quebec minister of youth and sports to establish an office of his department in Paris and that this same Maurice Jacquinot has also assumed the post of secretary general of the political action committee for the independence of Quebec in France as announced in Paris—

**Mr. Speaker:** Order. I wonder whether the hon. member would ask a question. It seems to me he is making a speech at the present time.

**Mr. Thompson:** My question is simply this. Has the government made a decision regarding the constitutional validity of such an office in a foreign country, particularly when the man appointed to that office is also acting on behalf of a separatist organization, as the hon. member for Lapointe announced?

**Right Hon. L. B. Pearson (Prime Minister):** Mr. Speaker, I have nothing to say about the man himself who is alleged to have been appointed. I do not know anything about him. However, it is not unusual for provincial governments to have representatives of departments of those governments in foreign countries.

**Mr. Jorgenson:** Would the Prime Minister refer the implications of this demand to the commission that is currently studying the price of farm machinery?

**Mr. Pearson:** I would be glad to do that, Mr. Speaker. I would think that would be one of the matters they certainly would be discussing, but I would be glad to bring my hon. friend's remarks to their attention.
