That Bill C-184, an Act to establish a Canadian corporation for telecommunication by satellite, be amended by deleting in subclause 2 of clause 12, all the words following "under subsection (3)" appearing on lines 19 to 22 on page 9.

He said: Mr. Speaker, the effect of this amendment is to free the Governor in Council in order that he may be able to appoint anybody as his representative on the board of directors of Telesat Canada. This amendment was proposed at the committee stage of the bill and received the same rather stiffnecked treatment from the minister as all other amendments proposed by private members. This attitude on the part of the minister even extended to textual improvement on a matter not relating to substance with regard to an amendment proposed by the hon. member for Halifax-East Hants (Mr. McCleave), and this experience leads me to believe that my amendment will not have much chance of passing.

This amendment provides us with an opportunity to raise a certain point of view with respect to the future development of government, quasi-government and mixed corporations. There is an apparent trend toward having the public service built into anything with which the government is concerned. There was evidence of this in Bill S-29, which received approval yesterday, when the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (Mr. Chrétien) said that not more than three members of the committee to be established under that bill would be members of the public service.
