Once shooting starts in Ulster, and the Orangemen are armed, there will be a bloodshed for which the nationalists also have rifles. The Orangemen will be further exasperated by the knowledge that the home rule bill will become law automatically within one month of its being sent to the house of lords.

The situation is full of terrific possibilities, for the "dishdash" Unionists will go to any lengths in inciting the Orangemen to rebellion on the chance of defeating the parliament act.
