ALL STARS WIN BY 4 TO 1

CROWD DISAPPOINTING

Rube Vickers Held Rochester Down to Eleven Scattered Hits and Should Have Scored Shut Out.

BALTIMORE, Sept. 30.—Rube Vickers, who lost to the champions in the opening game of the post-series with the All Stars, because errors put him in the hole, came to his own this afternoon, when he shut out the three-time pennant winners of the Eastern League. But for an error in the third inning this afternoon Rochester would have failed to score. The Stars bunched hits on Holmes to win the game in the first inning, in which Luck favored them as well.

The teams, which left Rochester in expectation of playing to a big Saturday crowd in Jack Dunn's town, drew only 150 people, the gross receipts of the day being \$2,500, of which the players got \$1,250. If they had remained in Rochester they would have drawn at least the same crowd under similar weather conditions and the expenses of a \$250 trip to Baltimore could have been saved.

After Rochester had failed to score in the half of the opening round, the Stars came back with three runs and clinched the decision.
