Jockey Shilling Loses License.

New York. Oct 13.—The stewards of the Jockey Club, at a meeting held in New York recently, took action in several important matters. On the report of the stewards of the Harford Agriculture and Breeders' Association, the jockey license of C. H. Shilling was revoked and the jockey license of J. Diggins was suspended until Nov. 1, 1912.

The application of Roscoe Troxier for a fockey license was denied, as were applications for reinstatement from W. B. Howell and J. G. Dorsey.

The revocation of Jockey Shilling's license probably means that his riding career is at an end. Shilling is one of the best of latter day jockeys. He has frequently been in trouble with the turf authorities during his riding career of some half dozen years.

Shilling rode on the Canadian circuit a year ago until he got himself into disfavor with the officials and was suspended for several months. Troxier was a frequenter of the Canadian half-mile tracks.


